A DAYLIGHT ROBBERY

THREE MEN HELD UP FACTORY GIRL CASHIERS

And Get Away With \$1,500—Girls Fought the Robbers and Saved \$800 From Them.

Toronto, April 10.—Three unknown men walked into the office of the sterling Action and Key Company here yesterday afternoon when two girls were distributing \$2,300 employees' pay envelopes, and the men held up the girls, a shipper and a commercial traveller at the point of four revolvers the three actioned \$1,500 of the cash into a black suitcase. Still keeping every person covered the three men backed out of the office and made a clean getaway.

When the men first gave the order, "Hands up!" the girls, Miss Alice Robertson and Miss May Hill-strop, refused to obey, and for five minutes fought the men around the room. Their plucky fight saved the firm \$800 cash, for in the struggle one of the three boxes containing envelopes fell on the floor and all the envelopes remained inside the box. In their hurry to get away the robbers passed up \$800 in cash lying at their feet.

Miss Robertson is now at home suffering from the effects of brutal treatment and choking received. One gumma fired at her as she was escaping from the office to call the police. The bullet lodged in the door case directly over her head.

ACTION WAS DISMISSED.

Judgment in Case Simmons Bros. vs. Powell and Sands.

Justice Britton has dismissed the action taken by Simmons Bros. against Charles H. Powell and Thos. W. Sands, heard at a recent sitting of the Supreme Court in Kingston. The action was dismissed with costs, and Mr. Powell was awarded \$40 damages and Mr. Sands \$30 damages.

In this case the plaintiff's claim was for an injunction order restraining the defendants from excavating, building or using part of lot 297, Princess street, owned by Mr. Powell. Defendants claimed damages for interference. Whiting and Day appeared for the plaintiffs and A. B. Cunningham for the defendants.

ESCAPED FROM GUARD ROOM.

Brockville Asked to Locate Missing Soldiers.

The police were notified last night that three soldiers, Privates Haughey, Brown and Malone, members of the 21st Battalion at Kingston, had broken out of the guard-house and disappeared, says the Belleville Times, of Friday. The men broke the iron bars over a window of the guard room at the barracks and made good their escape. If found they will be arrested as deserters. The local police searched the 3.30 a.m. express from the west and found three soldiers on the train, but all had passes and were able to satisfy the police that they were not the men wanted.
