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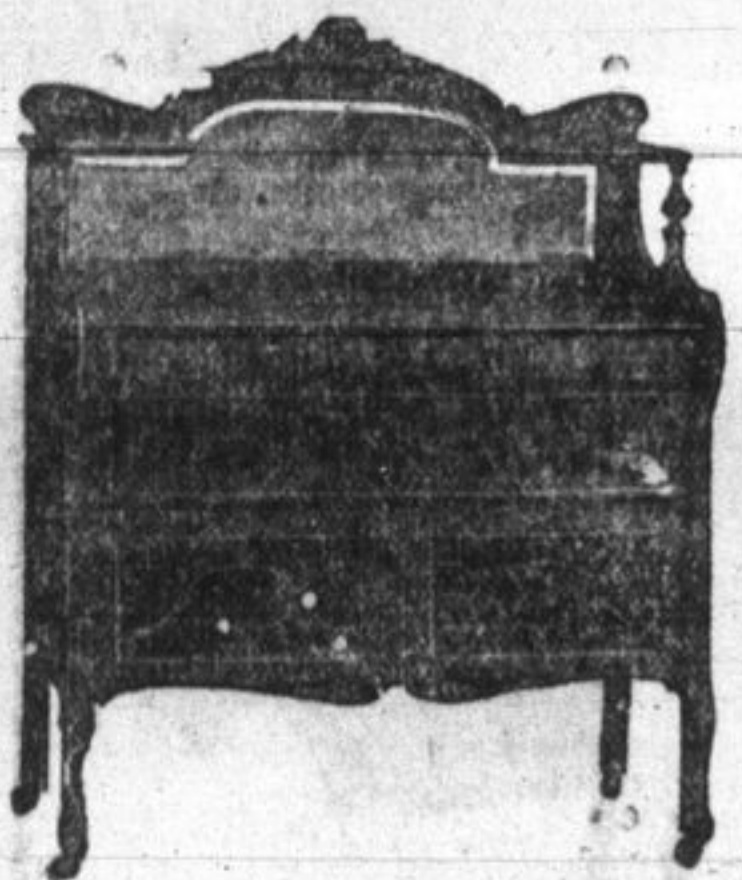

THE SPORT REVIEW

The Senate Committee reported favorable on a bill to prohibit prize fighting in Cuba.

Eldridge Eastman, the Nova Scotia colored professional sprinter, who has been running in England for a number of years, has joined the Northumberland Fusiliers, and has gone to the front.

New Westminster may play lacrosse with Vancouver after all. It leaked out that representatives of the cup holders have seen the officials of the Vancouver club with a view of settling the differences between the two clubs and patching up a new agreement.

Word comes from the Old Country that the winner of the Diamond Sculls at Henley last season, Gallie Sinigaglia, the giant Italian, who beat "Bob" Dibble, of the Dons, in a heart-breaking race in the finals, will visit Canada to row this summer.

Jack Johnson, the former champion heavy weight pugilist, has abandoned his plan to go by way of Santiago to Kingston and from Kingston to England. Johnson says he has now no plans in view, but that he may proceed direct to France or Spain or even remain in Havana indefinitely.

The Malone boxing bill, which would recognize the State Boxing Commission by creating four salaried positions of \$3,000 each and raise the tax on fight receipts from five to 7 1/2 per cent., passed the assembly today. The bill now goes to the senate and it is expected to pass that body. Governor Whitman indicated he would sign the measure.

Richard Marsh, who for years was trainer of the racetracks of Kind Edward and King George, is to receive royal assistance in straightening out the tangled financial affairs which recently threw him into bankruptcy. At a creditors' meeting announcement was made that King George, "out of consideration for his late father's old servant and his own servant," would provide \$3,000 (\$40,000) toward Marsh's debts.

Although it has a large number of its rowing members at the front, the Toronto Argonaut Rowing Club will probably have this year one of the most successful seasons since its organization. Besides what looks like a champion senior eight, the club will have a double, composed of E. B. Butler and Ernie Harcourt, that ought to be invincible in almost any company.

Among the Canadian entries to the annual Boston Marathon on April 13th are Edouard Fabre, Montreal, who "last year" ran second to "Jimmy" Duffy of Hamilton, and Arthur Jamieson, an Indian, of Hamilton, Ont. Both men are expected in the Hub Saturday. Fabre being accompanied by his trainer, Emile Lefebvre.

A pass to all games in the Federal League was sent to President Wilson yesterday by James A. Gilmore, president of the league. Although Washington has no club in the Federal organization, Gilmore wrote that he hoped the president would find occasion to use the pass in other cities during the season.

William Hale Thompson, Mayor-elect of Chicago, favors boxing for Chicago and Illinois. If the sport is properly conducted and regulated, he asserted. He indicated, however, that he intends to leave the question of whether this city is to have the glove sport with the State Legislators. A bill to legalize the sport has been introduced at Springfield. "I am strong for all kinds of clean athletic sports, and that includes boxing," the Mayor-elect said. "Boxing in Chicago would be great if we could have it governed under laws which prevail in New York and Wisconsin."

The eight of Leland Stanford, Jr. University won the international Pacific coast three-mile boat race on the Oakland Estuary Saturday. University of Washington finished second three-quarters of a length behind, and University of California third, eight lengths behind Washington.

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Jess Willard does not become champion by defeating Johnson. Previous to the war the International Boxing Union decided that the championship rested between Johnson and Langford, who were to have fought last November. Langford, therefore, retaining the right to meet the winner of the Jeanette-Johnson fight, according to the decision of the Boxing Union.

"Tom" Flanagan has returned to Toronto from Havana, where he acted as second and business manager to "Jack" Johnson in his recent unsuccessful battle with Jess Willard. "I am satisfied," said Mr. Flanagan, "that Johnson was by far the better man until the twentieth round and I doubt if there is a man living who could get the decision from Jack in twenty rounds, but here is something that the public does not know—Jack Johnson weighed 239 pounds on the day of the Havana battle instead of 225 as announced."

The veteran Eddie Plank, former Athletic southpaw and world hero pitcher, made his debut in the Federal League at St. Louis Saturday afternoon, when he was in the hurling pit for St. Louis opposed to Hendrix, the ex-Pirate, who was working for Chicago. Connie Mack asked waivers on Plank after last year's world series games, but Plank jumped to the Federals before waivers were secured.
