Walter Bell, the well known

The district attorney yesterday

on January 6th of Jerry Daly, a  
bookmaker connected with the Mariano  
Race Track. The district attorney  
said the evidence showed that  
DeBarret acted in self-defense.

"Eddie" Wright, former St. Thomas

**GARBAGE INCINERATOR**  
UTILITIES COMMISSION WOULD  
BEAR PORTION OF COST  
And Purchase Power and Superintendent  
Operation of Plant At the Expense  
Of the City.

The Civic Utilities Commission will  
co-operate with the City Council in  
paying part of the cost of the erec-  
tion of a chimney for an incinerator  
for garbage disposal, purchase  
the power produced thereby, and super-  
intend the operation of the incinerator,  
at the expense of the City Council.

A resolution to this effect was  
passed at the meeting of the Com-  
mission held on Monday afternoon,  
and the resolution was ordered to be  
presented to the City Council. The  
resolution was moved by Messrs. G.  
Y. Chown and R. H. Toye.

A report was received from the  
special committee of the City Council  
taking up the garbage question, in  
which the Commission was asked to  
provide a site, a chimney, the necessary  
apparatus, and also provide  
for the maintenance.

Chairman Rigney said that while  
he was in favor of the Commission  
co-operating with the City Council  
paying a portion of the cost, and  
buying the power, he did not con-  
sider that the Commission was called  
upon to enter into the work of main-  
taining a plant for the disposal of  
the garbage.

Mr. Chown said he was willing to  
have the Commission co-operate in  
the scheme, but he did not think it  
was up to the Commission to should-  
er the entire responsibility.

Mr. Toye and Mr. Birkett were  
of the same opinion. Mr. Toye  
thought there would be very little  
for the commission to derive out of  
it.

Mayor Sutherland said that the  
question was one which involved the  
interests of the citizens, and as both  
the Council and Commission were  
serving in this way, co-operation had  
been asked from the Commission by  
the Council.

Relative to the proposed new  
rates to be charged householders for  
electricity, following out the scheme  
of the Hydro-Electric Commission  
to charge according to floor space,  
the manager reported that ten men  
were at present engaged in measur-  
ing houses for the purpose of se-  
curing an estimate. The matter will  
be dealt with later.

The matter of an agreement be-  
tween J. M. Campbell and the Com-  
mission for a supply of power from  
Kingston Mills is now in the hands  
of the Hydro-Electric Commission.

Mayor Sutherland brought up the  
question of granting concessions to  
the local hospitals on water rates,  
but no action was taken.

France is equipped Notre  
Dame Cathedral and other fam-  
ous buildings for military pur-
