**AUSTRIA IS TO TAKE**

THE UNDESIRABLES OFF THE HANDS OF HUNGARY.

Galician Refugees in Hundreds of Thousands To Be Placed in Camps—Tisza Forced This Action.

Budapest, April 14.—The Austrian-Hungarian Government, after a few weeks' negotiations, have made arrangements regarding the Galician refugees who are scattered over Hungary in hundreds of thousands and have become such a nuisance that the Hungarian Government has deemed it necessary to get rid of them. According to the arrangements made, the Hungarian Government will simply expel them from the country as undesirable aliens and the Austrian Government will install them in concentration camps erected for that purpose. Count Tisza recognized this question as of grave importance, and went to Vienna a few days ago with this special problem in mind. I am informed that he made the Austrian Government understand that they would have to look after the Galician refugees for if no satisfactory arrangements were reached he would expel them. There can be no question of the sentiment with regard to the Galicians, whose sojourn in the country has raised the criminal statistics three hundred per cent in the last half-year. In fact, the behavior of these people cannot be imagined. They not only practiced extortion and forced the prices of foodstuffs to an artificial height, but their frauds and other crimes against property are so innumerable and impudent that the Jewish population of Hungary and the keenest pro-Semites are applauding the Government decision to expel them.

A most curious fact is that they are, almost without exception, well-to-do and even rich, though their exterior would lead one to think them beggars and they accept the beggar's dole. The weekly state allowance for refugees are demanded for all, although their koftans are lined with money. They have formed associations and speculated in everything, piled up flour and vegetables when the bread famine was almost unendurable and forged everything that could be forged. One of them committed fraud on both the Austrian and Hungarian exchequers. He was a wealthy man and had a great setate in Galicia and horses were requisitioned from his stables there. Later he had to fly from the Russians and collected 18,000 crowns in Vienna and the same amount in Budapest for the same horses. When they arrested him he offered 100,000 crown bail, but this was refused.

**WAR BULLETINS.**

- Officially announced that five were killed and forty hurt in the mysterious explosion at Lerwick naval base. German spies are suspected.
- The German cruiser Kronprinz Wilhelm is reported sinking at her anchorage at Newport News, but her commander still declares he will return to sea.
- The seventh casualty list of Neuve Chapelle battle issued Tuesday night brings the total casualties up to 7,900, including 2,400 killed and more lists to come.
- The British torpedo boat destroyer Renard and the battleship London made a ten-mile dash up the Dardanelles, returning uninjured.
- The Russians captured three of the heights guarding Uszok Pass; 2,700 Austrians were taken prisoners with in last two days.
- It is officially announced that Capt. Buller has been appointed to command the Pats, to succeed the late Lieut.-Col. Farquhar.
- Grimsby despatches say eight trawlers are considerably overdue. It is feared they were torpedoed or hit mines.
- The Germans fearing an advance on Metz are sending considerable reinforcements to that region.
- Canadians are called on for service in the air. Applicants must be between the ages of 21 and 23.
