#### AUSTRIA IS TO TAKE

THE UNDESIRABLES OFF THE HANDS OF HUNGARY.

Galician Fefugees In Hundreds Of Thousands To Be Placed In Camps - Tisza Forced This Action. Budapest, April 14.-The Aus-

trian-Hungarian Governments, after a few weeks' negotiations, have made arrangements regarding the Galician refugees who are scattered over Hungary in hundreds of thousands and have become such a nulsance that the Hungarian Government has deem ed it necessary to get rid of them According to the arrangements made, the Hungarian Government will simply expel them from the country as purpose.
