"Some time ago, at the request of your honorable body, we engineered for you the installation of your ornamental street lighting system. After plans were made for the first installation you requested a further exten-50c to \$1.00 a dozen and onions. There lights were installed, apparent-\$1,00 a bushel. from press reports the results have been eminently satisfactory. "We find that at the present time you are only operating halt of the ninety-six lamps installed, apparently with the idea of saving on the expenses of street lighting. This matter has been brought to the attention of your Utilities Commission, who son's advise that the Lights are operated in accordance with the wishes of your body. We write to explain this mat-

ter to you.

turning off half the lamps you merely save in current consumed and in renewals, such as electrodes, etc. We have estimated that the saving per year due to these factors is only about \$1,400. This is a small item when it is considered that you sacrifice the use of half of the lamps and therefore, half of your investment. Instead of a modern and pleasing 'white way' effect, your main street lighting. presents a very poor appearance to the stranger coming to the city; it appears as though an error had been made in installing so many lamps. With the total number of lamps burning, you have no more light than is necessary to give a real 'white-way' effect which, for advertising value alone, is certainly worth the price. Since the Commission engineered this matter and installed the system at

your request, we feel a vital interest therein, and also since, with the pres-ent method of operation, the unin-formed man might judge that we erin installing so extensive a sys-"We beg to present this matter for your careful consideration, and trust that you will find it possible and more satisfactory, all things consid-

ered, to operate the full number of lamps and secure the maximum benefit from the effect produced. We will be glad to have an expression of opinion from you at your earliest con-
