MACHINE GUN SECTION

OF THE 21ST BATTALION IS THOROUGHLY TRAINED.

The Men Are Very Proficient In Their Work—The 21st Has Six Machine Guns.

The "specialists" of the 21st Battalion include the Machine-Gun Section and the Signallers. The former section under the very capable command of Lieut. Raymond has been progressing so rapidly in its work that the men are everywhere being complimented by those who understand the machine gun. This is the first time that machine-guns have been included in the establishment of a battalion, and at the front every infantry battalion of the Canadian Expeditionary Force has at least two and usually four of these guns. Up to the time of the outbreak of the war there were practically no really capable instructors in machine gun drill. A regular system of training was made and officers were given a chance to qualify as instructors. Sergt.-Major Edwards was acquainted with the work before coming to Canada and the 21st Battalion was fortunate enough to secure his services. He trained a number of officers and N.C.O.'s of the battalion and Lieut. Raymond showed up so well that he was given the position as commander of the section.

Before the men were transferred to the Machine Gun Section they had to prove that their eye-sight was better than the average and as brains are also a very necessary part of the work, only men of high intelligence were given the much desired positions. To-day the Machine Gun Section is recognized as one of the strongest branches of the 21st Battalion. The men are able to set up their gun in record time accurately and are also well enough educated in the mechanism to know how to fix any trouble that might occur.

It is interesting to note that the 21st Battalion has six machine guns, including two from the penitentiaries, while other battalions have only four.

EDISON'S NEW SUBMARINE

Will Enable Crew To Live Under Water 100 Days.

New York, April 15.—The United States Government is building at its navy yard at Portsmouth, N.H., a submarine of a type that will excel any boat of the type in existence, in the matter of under sea steaming radius and which will be equipped with apparatus designed and built by Thomas A. Edison and will enable its crew to live for a period of one hundred days at the bottom of the sea if the craft should meet with an accident similar to that which disabled the P-4 in Honolulu harbor.

This announcement was made tonight by Miller Reese Hutchison, chief engineer and personal representative of Mr. Edison. It is asserted that the new Edison batteries will give the submarine an undersea cruising range of more than 150 miles, more than a third longer than that of any present submarine, and will eliminate the dangers to the crew of chlorine and sulphuric acid gas poisoning.

PART OF PAY FOR WIVES.

Ottawa Repairs Neglect Of Indifferent Husbands.

London, April 15.—Major Maurice Alexander, chief paymaster for the Canadian forces, has recovered from a bad attack of influenza and is now located in offices in London. The volume of financial work in the paymaster's office is reflected in the great activity at the West End branch of the Bank of Montreal, where cheques representing thousands of pounds in small amounts are cashed daily.

Indifference or opposition on the part of many soldiers to assigning a portion of their pay to their wives has resulted in the passing of an order-in-council at Ottawa giving the department power to assign a moiety to pay to wives where circumstances call for such action.

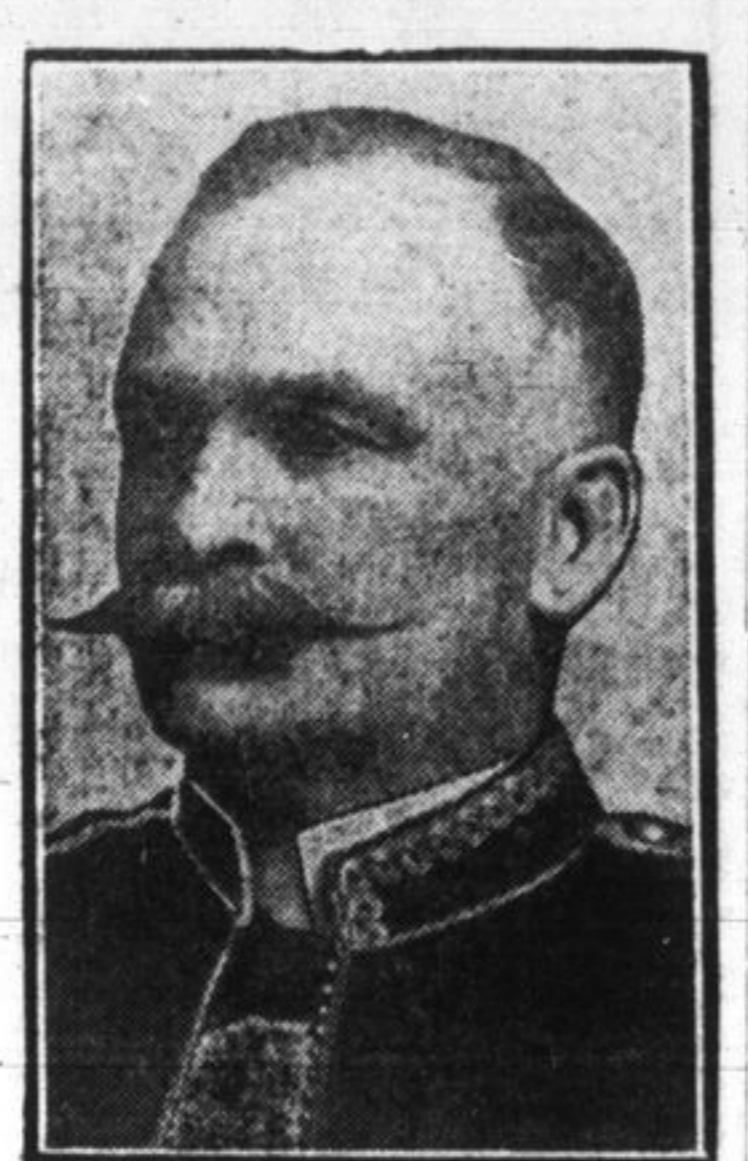

CHRISTIANITY IN JAPAN.

Germany's Conception Of the Deity Wrong, Says Premier.

Tokio, April 15.—Addressing a well-attended meeting of Japanese and foreign Christians held in Tokio yesterday to inaugurate an evangelistic movement preparatory to the International Sunday School Convention of 1916, Count Okuma, the Japanese premier, made the statement that Christianity had given Japan, among other things, a nobler conception of womanhood. Continuing, the premier made reference to the situation in Europe when he said: "There must be a wrong conception of the Deity in Germany; otherwise, this war could not have come."

RETURNS TO HIS HOME.

"Been Riding in Fast Auto," Is All He Murmurs.

Binghamton, N.Y., April 15.—J. B. Cole, prominent merchant of Endicott, near here, disappeared three weeks ago last night. He closed his store at about eight o'clock and started for home.

A package he was taking home was found behind a fence near his home later. Persons in the vicinity told about hearing a high-powered automobile speeding away at about nine o'clock on the night Mr. Cole disappeared. His family believed that he had been slain and his body was thrown in the Susquehanna River. Early yesterday morning Mr. Cole was found by a policeman on the street corner here. Mr. Cole had no recollection of where he was during the three weeks, but constantly murmurs, "Been riding in fast automobile."

OFFER A BASE HOSPITAL.

Senate of University of Alberta Has So Decided.

Edmonton, April 15.—The Senate of the University of Alberta decided yesterday to make an offer to the Militia Department of the personnel and equipment for a base hospital of 250 beds in either England or France for the military forces. This offer was wired to Col. Crutcher, as military commanding officer for the district, and he will communicate it to the proper quarter.

WAR BULLETINS.

Both Paris and Petrograd were silent Wednesday evening and it was thought that important movements were pending on both fronts.

In a statement Wednesday night about German submarines, Winston Churchill said Britain had nothing to fear. She still controlled the seas and underseas.

Dunkirk has reports of two more German submarines being caught in traps set by the French and sunk. Ships arriving at Christiana, Norway, report passing ten warships in the North Sea without colors. They are thought to be Germans.

Turkish troops have invaded Persia and surrounded the Government House at Kasrishin.

Sir John French ascribes the victory of Neve Chapelle and St. Lo to the magnificent dash of the infantry, especially the Indians. He places the total casualties at 12,811 men. A greater victory was possible, but somebody blundered.

The Turks are massing troops and guns on Gallipoli Peninsula, in the Dardanelles; many German aeroplanes arrive.

The official report says 22,000 troops attacked the British position in Turkish territory, but were driven off leaving 300 prisoners. British losses were ninety-two men.

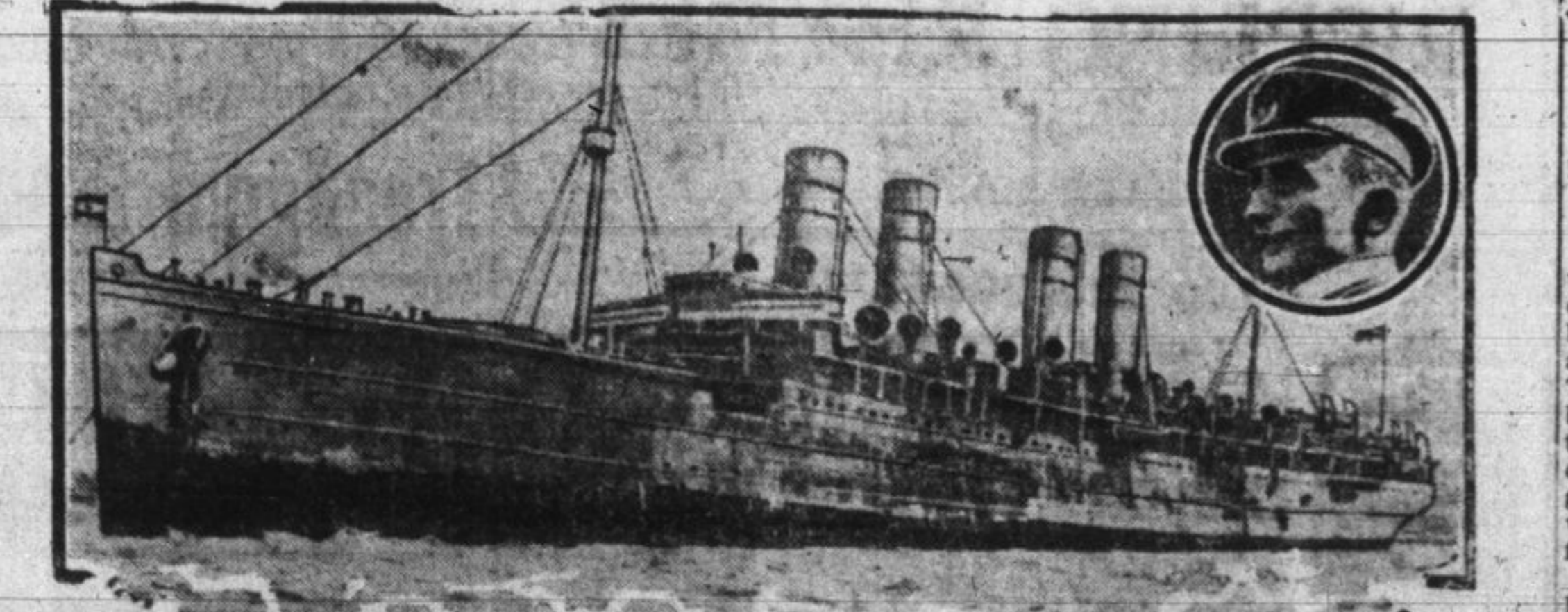
