SIX MONTHS IN JAIL

GEORGE REDDEN SENTENCED BY THE MAGISTRATE

Hired Bicycle in Kingston and Sold It To a Party at Ganoquo—Alfred Smith, Who Attempted Suicide, Will Undergo Medical Treatment.

Shortly after Constable James Bateson received word on Friday afternoon that George Redden was wanted on a charge of stealing a bicycle, the property of George Muller, Kingston, he had Redden locked up in a cell at the Police Station and the accused appeared before the Court on Saturday morning. Magistrate Farrell sentenced him to six months in jail. Redden has been before the Court on many occasions. His love for strong drink is his great trouble. He has attempted suicide several times and has had a great deal of trouble.

Mr. Muller rented a bicycle to Redden and the latter, instead of returning it at the time he promised to, rode to Ganoquo on it and while there sold it to a party for \$8. The wheel was valued at \$25.

The Ganoquo police suspected that Redden did not own the bicycle and communicated with the Kingston police and also with Mr. Muller. The latter went down to Ganoquo identified his wheel, and then word was sent to Kingston to have Redden rounded up. Constable Bateson arrested him at his home on Ontario street.

Redden was very drunk when placed under arrest and when before the magistrate the liquor had such an effect on him that he could not stand still.

Alfred Smith, who tried to commit suicide by jumping into the water at the foot of Brock street, came up after a week's remand.

"I understand that you are in need of hospital treatment," said the magistrate to Smith, "and I am going to suspend sentence."

Smith said he had been under a doctor's care, and that he would take hospital treatment. With this understanding he was allowed to go.

The fact that Frederick Snyder came all the way from New York to Kingston to consult a doctor, speaks well for the local medical men. While here Snyder incidentally managed to get "fall." He was allowed to go.
