A Railway Lesson From Germany

Montreal, April 16.—(To the Editor) We hear a great deal about the wonderful scientific organization of the Germans, but the Germans themselves appear to have their doubts whether in the case of their railways the organization was as perfect as it might have been. Otherwise, why should the Kaiser have gone over the heads of all his regular railway officials and put a steamship director Herr Ballin, in charge of all railway transport during the war? Among the railway systems of Germany, all of which are operated by Government officials, the Prussian State Railways are the chief and most successful. One might have thought that for the emergency of war some official might have been found in the ranks of the Prussian State Railways themselves for the supreme direction of transport. Apparently the Prussian State Railway System does not produce men capable of meeting emergencies and as there are no private railways in Germany from which a capable man could be drawn, recourse had to be made to another form of private business, for a leader, Herr Ballin, who got this responsible position, knew very little about railways, but he had strong initiative characteristic which is a sine qua non in private enterprise.

In these days when politicians are taking up the cry for nationalization of railways, it is well to draw attention to such a notable instance of the weakness of the State Railway System. However well intentioned the state official may be, he lives in an atmosphere which annihilates individual initiative. — ADAM B. SMITH.

The War Stamps.

Kingston, April 16.—(To the Editor) The various reports that are read respecting the new War Tax, as far as it relates to postage, are so contradictory, that temporary stamps are being done the community a favor if you publish the exact ruling, viz.: Is it absolutely necessary to put a War Tax stamp on a letter, or is it sufficient to put an extra one-cent stamp? The reason that this information is asked for is, that the last issue of paper it was reported that over 300 letters were consigned to the Dead Letter Office, although they had an extra one-cent stamp affixed.—Yours truly, CORRESPONDENCE.

According to recent orders either three cents in postage or war stamps will be accepted on letters. Inland Revenue stamps cannot be used on letters.

STORY OF A BROKEN ARM.

R. B. Bennett, M.P., of Calgary Writes a Letter.

Last January, Harry Hight, formerly of Calgary, while sojourning in our midst for a few hours en route to Kingston, where he had secured employment, fell on the sidewalk, some where in town, the exact spot being still to be determined. That morning it had rained and frozen and the streets were slippery. Mr. Hight fell and broke his right wrist. He was attended, while in town by Dr. Smith, but after temporary repairs, continued on his way. At Kingston, it seems that he was laid up in a hospital for eight weeks, during which time, and ever since, the council has periodically been asked for financial assistance. These communications were, on the last evening of the Street's Committee, who reported that in their opinion the town was in no way liable for any claim. Mr. Hight, however, had still a card to play, and so at the meeting on Monday, a letter came from R. B. Bennett, M.P., of Calgary, who informed the Council that the said Mr. Hight was a valuable member of his constituency, and while there was on legal liability on the Council, still perhaps there was a moral obligation, and requested that the matter be re-considered.

Councillor Rochester was for paying financial heed to the request and shelling out to the extent of a few dollars. In this Councillor Handford did not concur, and the matter was once again referred to the Street's Committee.

The death occurred in Brockville on Wednesday, after a brief illness, of Robert McFadden, who had reached the advanced age of ninety-five years.

April 17.—The Thousand Islands Motor League, organized here a year ago in affiliation with the Ontario Motor League, held a largely attended banquet at the Brophy House on Thursday evening, at which upwards of sixty sat down. The annual business session of the League was held, with Dr. C. H. Bird, president, in the chair. The question of withdrawal from the O.M.L. was given a thorough discussion, after which a motion was made by John O'Connor to separate from that organization, and by so doing reduce the fee of membership from \$5 to \$2.50 per annum. On the vote being taken this was carried by a large majority. The report of the Secretary-Treasurer, G. Weib, gave a short resume of the year's work and showed the League in fair financial condition with a surplus of \$101.41. Dr. J. P. Sinclair, W. V. Bullock and S. C. Taylor were named as a committee to draft rules and regulations. The election of officers resulted: Hon. president, Senator George Taylor; President, Dr. C. H. Bird; Vice-President, D. E. Johnston, Lansdowne; Secretary-Treasurer, George Weib; Directors, Dr. Bradley, Lansdowne Village; W. W. Shipman, Lansdowne Front; Jos. Singleton, Lansdowne Rear; Jos. DeWolfe, Leeds Front; R. Galloway, Leeds Rear; William Fairman, Pittsburg Front; M. Shortill, Pittsburg Rear; Dr. J. P. Sinclair, Gananoque; Mayor Dr. F. J. O'Connor, Gananoque; Solicitor, W. Balfour Mudge. The directors were also named as a committee to look after good roads and the placing of sign boards. Reeve Dempster, Lansdowne, and Reeve Darling, Gananoque, gave short addresses.

At a special meeting of the Red Cross branch of the Gananoque Patriotic League and Relief Association held on Thursday evening the Misses Annie Stark and Laura McCammon, who are going to the front as nurses with the Second contingent, were presented with steamer rugs. Rev. Dr. Gracey was in the chair and made the presentation. Short addresses were given by Mayor Dr. O'Connor, Rev. J. P. Keohoe and Rev. Walter Cox. Miss Stark left yesterday and Miss McCammon will leave shortly for overseas.

Mrs. Annie Smith passed away on Wednesday last at the home of her brother, William Fair, Leeds and Lansdowne Front. The remains were forwarded to Lyndhurst on Wednesday and the funeral was held there yesterday afternoon.

The steamship Hinckley was the first vessel to arrive in port with a cargo this season and therefore Captain Hinckley wins the silk hat for 1915. He brought in a cargo of coal on Thursday afternoon for the works of the Steel Co. of Canada.

Joseph Crowley, Charles street, has secured a position with a Toronto firm as book-keeper and has left to enter on his new duties.

Hugh Calvert, Main street, left the latter part of this week for Toronto to take a position.

April 19.—Last evening in St. John's Church, Father Cox, S.J., Loyola College, Montreal, delivered a lecture dealing with the main conditions in European affairs to-day. The choir rendered a programme of special selections for the occasion and the Citizens' Band furnished aural selections for the close of the service a special collection in aid of the church debt was taken, to which a generous response was made.

Rev. Dr. Gracey took charge of the services in St. Andrew's Church yesterday for the first since receiving deserved recognition from Knox College, and was greeted by large congregations at both services.

Rev. Walter Cox, rector of Christ Church received the sad news on Thursday of the death of his father, Rev. Charles Bardell Cox, at Tivethall, Norwich, England, aged 72. He was an ardent temperance reformed and was for years a minister of the Society of Friends.

At a meeting of the Catholic Literary and Athletic Club last week a baseball team was organized with Alexander Dorey as manager.

The coal schooner Horace Taber, Captain Frank Barnhart, arrived with her first cargo of the season yesterday, and is now unloading at Taylor's wharf.

The steam barge Hinckley finished unloading Saturday evening and cleared light for another cargo.

6,000 VILLA SOLDIERS.

Are Reported Slaughtered and 8,000 Captured.

El Paso, April 17.—Six thousand Villa soldiers were killed and eight thousand captured, together with thirty cannon and large quantities of ammunition, in a two-day battle at Celaya, between the forces commanded by General Oregon and General Villa, according to official advices made public here yesterday by the Carranza consular officials.

No news has come from Villa's headquarters. The Carranza information is that the battle began on Tuesday and continued until Thursday afternoon, when the Villa army retreated northward in disorder. General Villa was in personal command of his forces.
