(Special to the Whig.) London, April 23 .- A great battle in the North Sea, the most titanic engagement in the history of naval warfare, may be a question of hours. All commercial shipping has been cleared from the old German Ocean and all preparations are complete for atrial of strength between the British fleet and the German fleet, supported by the Heligoland fortress. .

Dardanelles Must Be Forced.

London, April 23 .- The great fleet, battering at the Turkish positions which block the gate to Constantinople, has been augmented by several new warships, chief of them the Warspite, equipped with sixteen-inch guns. prisoners. 
