THE 21ST HONORED

ST. GEORGE'S DAY BY HOLDING SPECIAL PARADE.

MISSION WORK IN INDIA.

Address By Miss R. Turner In St. James Hall.

In St. James' Sunday school hall on Thursday evening, Miss R. T. Turner, Honorary Deputation Secretary for the Zenana Bible and Medical Mission, delivered an interesting lecture, illustrated with beautiful colored lantern pictures. The pictures, which are deservedly said to be the finest collection of slides on Indian Mission work in this country, were nearly all taken by Miss Turner herself.

The lecturer pointed out that the Society she represents was the oldest and still the only one which works exclusively for the women of India, of whom there are 153,000,000. Pictures of scenes in the city of Bombay and some of the mission work by the Society there were followed by views of India's great sacred rivers, showing the ceremonial bathing, the preparation for burning the Hindu dead, types of Indian women, some of the 365,000,000 of God's worshippers' temples and street scenes, concluding with many realistic pictures of the hospitals, schools and workers of the mission as they are seen at their daily work.

The speaker described the great suffering of the women and children, showing how only women can reach these and help. She said that in every eleven of the women were widows, and told how these widows are made outcasts on the death of their husbands. In this connection, an earnest plea was made for the women and children whose husbands and fathers are fighting at the front. Anyone ready to help these soldiers can send to the headquarters of the mission at 14 Selby street, Toronto.

Miss Turner also addressed a meeting on Friday afternoon at the home of Mrs. R. A. McLelland, 148 East street. On Saturday at noon Miss Turner will leave for the Toronto headquarters before she enters upon a long series of addresses throughout the western cities of Canada.

The fact is, that this concern has not supplied a single jar of jam to the troops—they have not even tendered on anything to the Government.
