As reported in the press, it might easily have appeared so, because the name of the firm was variously given, and no attempt was made to indicate just which MacLaren concern was involved. The unfortunate similarity in name has caused the MacLaren Imperial Cheese Company, Limited, considerable annoyance. The fact is, that this concern has not supplied a single jar of jam to the troops they have not even tendered on anything to the Government. They say they are quite busy enough supplying the Canadian public the specialties that have become so favorably known as their products.


