**GERMANY'S SOCIALISTS**

ARE SAID TO BE VERY EARNEST FOR PEACE.

They Are Endeavoring To Get Into Touch With Their French and British Brethren.

The Hague, April 23.—The Socialists of Germany are making an earnest effort to seek for a basis on which the cessation of the war can be brought about. Dr. Breheide, a prominent member of the German Socialist Party is now in Holland consulting the Dutch Socialist leaders with a view to getting into communication with the British, and through them, with the French Socialists in an endeavor to bring pressure to bear on the various governments.

It is declared that the German Socialists are virtually unanimous in favor of peace and against any annexation of territory. It is said that although the Socialist newspapers in Germany are not permitted under penalty of suspension to publish criticisms of the Government or express scepticism regarding the results of the war, at a meeting where only members of the party were admitted and from which the police were absent, free discussions in favor of peace took place.

The general view of the Socialists, it is said, is that Alsace-Lorraine should belong to neither France nor Germany, but should be autonomous. The argument is that if France recaptures the provinces a ranking for vengeance would be held by a large part of the population, which, it is asserted, does not desire to be governed by the French and that, therefore, the situation would be as bad as ever.

It is reported that the great East Prussian landowners are trying to treat for peace with Russia, owing to fears that their property will suffer but the Socialists are said to have expressed the opinion that the prospects of a durable peace are more likely through an arrangement of terms by Germany with France and England and by evacuating Belgium. With reference to the Dardanelles it is declared that the German Socialists believe that it will not be feasible to internationalize or neutralize the straits until a United States of Europe has been formed. They assert that the futility of neutrality has already been shown.

The Socialists of Germany assert that it will be impossible to starve Germany, but express the belief that the war cannot continue much longer in consequences of the disastrous effect on the economic conditions of all the countries engaged.

**RETAINS THE POWER OF VETOING LICENSES**

Provincial Secretary Will Lighten the Work of Commissioners at First.

Toronto, April 23.—Hon. W. J. Hanna has retained the power to veto licenses and has also retained the control of the granting of the brewery and wholesale liquor licenses. Clause twelve of the new act was excluded when the proclamation handing over the control of the liquor business to the Central Commission was announced.

The reason for leaving out this clause is simply to give the provincial Secretary power to cancel licenses that may be issued this year. It also leaves the department control to collect the big percent on bar receipts. This is done because the new Board will have a great deal of work on their hands taking over the duties now held by the hundred and more license commissions throughout the Province and it is not deemed wise to put too large a burden on their shoulders until they have become more familiar with their duties.
