**WAR BULLETINS.**

The German Admiralty says officially that the German high seas fleet has repeatedly cruised in the North Sea without encountering anything of the British fleet.

It was stated at the Washington State Department Friday that Great Britain was about to further tighten the blockade on German contraband from the United States.

Two Zeppelins were sighted off the Northumberland coast on the North Sea Friday afternoon and flew eastward pursued by a fleet of British aeroplanes.

It is stated that Germany, Austria and Italy have now entered a definite agreement that Italy shall keep her neutrality.

Latest reports indicate that a terrific battle for the possession of the hills at Ypres is still going on. The British losses are heavy but no ground ceded.

A German merchant steamer sunk by British off Lima, Peru, crew saved.

Russian cavalry is again raiding East Prussia.

"Twilight Sleep" Discredited.

New York, April 24.—Too many "blue babies" and too high a percentage of deaths among the twilight sleep infants have caused two of the largest maternity hospitals in New York to abandon the latest method for painless childbirth.

The Polyclinic and the City hospitals authorized this announcement to-day. At the Jewish Maternity and the Sloane Maternity hospitals it was said the use of the "twilight sleep" treatment has been greatly restricted.

Physicians in charge of the Polyclinic medical school and the City Hospital, St. Patrick's Island to-day denied that the twilight sleep treatment had been entirely abandoned.

Dr. George Shears of the Polyclinic said the treatment will be continued in some cases.

Asking For Flower Seeds

Berlin, April 24.—The soldiers at the front are asking for flower seeds. The newspapers print letters suggesting that seeds enclosed in packages and sent to the front can be used for the planting on the graves of soldiers and in other ways.
