



FRENCH CRUISER WAS TORPEDOED

the Crew Were

Paris, April 28.—The big French armored cruiser Leon Gambetta of 12,352 tons displacement was torpedoed and sunk, presumabily by an Austrian submarine, in the Adriatic, off Otranto. It is not known as yet how many of the crew were drowned but the Minister of Marine believes some were saved. The report of the sinking of the cruiser was contained in an official communique made public by the Minister of Marine. It stated that the warship was torpedoed on Monday night and that details were lacking.

The Gambetta was built at Brest in 1901. She carried a crew of 725 men and had a speed of 23 knots. Her armament consisted of four 7.6 inch, sixteen 4.5 guns.
