GERMAN BATTLE CRUISERS HAVE BOMBARDED DUNKIRK?

(Special to the Whig.) Paris, April 30.—German warships are operating on the Belgian coast, according to official information received at the War Office. It is stated that they have shelled Dunkirk, nineteen shells falling in the city, killing twenty and wounding forty-five.

It is believed here that the German warships were sent south to co-operate with the German army in a new drive against the French coast. The success of the British warships last fall in checking the first German drive with light draft monitors and cruisers is believed to have inspired the latest German move.

It is believed here that the warships now off the Belgian coast are fast battle cruisers of the type which raided the English coast during the winter. It is thought here that at least a squadron has been despatched to head them off, and news of another naval battle is expected at any time.

Bombardment Was By Artillery?

(Special to the Whig.) Berlin (via Wireless through Sayville), April 30.—To-day's official report from the War Office tells of the shelling of Dunkirk and the British fortress of Harwich, and declares that the French and British offensive in the north has been checked.

The report makes no mention of the reported German raid on warships on the lower Belgian coast, and in discussing the shelling of Dunkirk, which the Paris official statement says was from warships, says it was "by German artillery." Regarding Harwich, the report says: "Our aerial forces have bombarded the fortified town of Harwich."

ATTITUDE OF THE SWISS.

New Phase of the Question Should Italy War.

Rome, April 30.—Next to the question whether Italy will join the war on the side of the Allies, comes that of the attitude of Switzerland in such event. The republic is credited her with a preponderance of German sympathies, added to which she has the lesson of the fate of Belgium before her eyes should she resist Germany's pressure to allow the troops of the Fatherland to pass through to attack Italy. It would be easy to protest and give way, representing that it was a case of force majeure.

On the other hand, Italy centres her hopes in the sturdy independence of Switzerland and her pledged word to be neutral, also her fear lest she lose the Italian and French cantons at the end of the war, should she give way to the enemies of the Allies. Moreover, there is the fear of families should the road to replenish through Italy be closed.

The situation is most critical, Switzerland may escape the fate of Belgium owing to her superior strategic position and the present weakness of Germany and Austria. It is felt in Rome that the war still may have many unpleasant surprises.

THINK TIME INOPPORTUNE

No Official Memorial Service in London For Fallen Canadians.

London, April 30.—The acting High Commissioner for Canada, Sir George H. Perley, the agent-general and others, held a conference tonight to consider the advisability of arranging a memorial service in London for Canadians who have fallen in battle. It was resolved that the present was an inopportune time for such a function. It is quite probable, though, that such a service will be arranged by the friends of the dead heroes.

PITH OF THE NEWS

Condensed Items By Telegraphic and From Exchanges

W. F. Maclean, M.P., has declared himself for any early general election on the war issues.

A coroner's jury urged the Ontario Government to "wake up" and erect a Psychiatric Institute.

In London, one day's appeal through the press has given the army all the respirators needed.

In Montreal, Hon. Thomas Chase Casgrain is putting forth every effort to prevent a dissolution of Parliament.

The steamer Keywest, loaded with grain from Port Colborne to Montreal, is reported ashore east of Port Weller.

John Purvis, Holyrood, was chosen Federal candidate by the Conservatives of South Bruce, to oppose R. E. Truax, M.P.

W. F. Bradshaw has been appointed general manager of Reuter's Telegram Company in succession to the late Baron De Reuter.

The Secretary of the British Admiralty declared that no hardships had been imposed upon the German submarine crew held in Britain.

William Michael, Hamilton Township, aged eighty-three died suddenly in the arms of his brother on opening the door to receive him on a visit.

General Von Klück, the German commander, who was wounded last month, is now on the road to recovery, according to the Hamburg Nachrichten.

Six illustration farms are to be managed under the direction of the Dominion Government Department of Agriculture in Southern Alberta. Each plot contains forty-five acres.

Alexander Noble, Toronto, has had a brother killed in France, another has died of wounds, and his brother-in-law went down when the Good Hope was sunk off the coast of Chile.

A despatch from Stockholm says that King Gustave is seriously ill, apparently with a recurrence of the stomach trouble for which he underwent an operation a year ago.

Persistent reports that parts of submarine boats have been shipped from the United States into Canada are still under investigation. Secretary Bryan stated at Washington.

Judge David Marr Walker, A. L. Bonnycastle and Lendrum McMeera are appointed the Board of License Commissioners for the Province of Manitoba, under the new legislation.

James Stewart Tupper, K. C., Winnipeg, has died in England, where he had been under the care of Sir William Osler for the past few months. The late Mr. Tupper was the oldest son of Sir Charles Tupper.

An attempt to burn down the Western Hotel at Sarnia, while forty guests were asleep in it, was discovered by a passer-by barely in time to save the building and prevent possibly the loss of lives.

New Industry For Deseronto.

Deseronto, April 30.—On April 14th, the Dominion Government granted the application of the Rathbun Match Co., Limited, for a charter of incorporation, the incorporators being Messrs. R. P. Locke, G. Cooper and William Kaspar Fraser, all of Toronto, and the capitalization is \$125,000. The charter, in addition to matches, covers sundry wood products, which it is the intention of the company to produce. The officers of the new company are: President and treasurer, H. W. Rathbun; manager, G. G. Gardiner; secretary, L. E. S. Hodge. Improvements to the building purchased by the company have already commenced, and the necessary machinery has been contracted for. The company intend starting operations at the earliest opportune moment after the machinery, etc., has been installed.

Settled Out of Court

Smith's Falls, Ont., April 30.—Leonard Saunders sued the Canadian Northern Railway Company for \$5,000 damages for the loss of his left hand while working in a gravel pit on the C.N.O.R. near Smith's Falls last September. The case was settled out of court, plaintiff getting \$1,000 for damages and all costs, and the company undertaking to teach the plaintiff telegraphy and give him employment thereat.

Vancouver Germans Arrested.

Vancouver, B.C., April 30.—Four prominent German citizens of Vancouver arrived here on Sunday night, with a number of other compatriots, they engaged in a celebration of the German advance against Canadian troops at Ypres.

Douglas Huestis will represent University of Toronto at the international intercollegiate individual gymnastic championships next Saturday at St. John's College grounds, in Brooklyn, Yale, Harvard, Columbia, Pennsylvania, Princeton and all the representative universities will have men in the competition. Huestis is one of the best performers on the bars ever turned out at Varsity, and he is likely to give a good account of himself.

Miss Gladys Ravenscroft, formerly British woman golf champion has decided to go to the front with the "Bantams" Regiment. She has been looking after the material comforts of the men ever since the corps was organized. The "Bantams" are composed of men under the regulation size. She marches at their head, when they parade, and they look up to her, and upon her, as their mascot.

Hon. Sam's Humor.

Weekly Sun, Toronto: We begin to see through Major-General Hon. Sam, or at least to understand his mode of exposition, which is so unusual that misapprehension will be excused. The truth came in a recent interview with a delegation from an American brotherhood which sought the privilege of setting up among the soldiers a dry canteen. They were inferentially, it seemed, "hot air puffers," a phrase not known in good literature except in a literal sense, and also on the make. Others just as pretentious and becoming in appearance had behaved so patiently at Valcartier. If he granted their request he would be obliged to concede similar privileges to the other two hundred and seventy-six thousand brotherhoods of St. Mark, Lake John, Michigan and all the rest, in all probability not more than two or three. Give A Child An Allowance.

An allowance is the best safeguard against the habit of extravagance, if the child is taught to spend the money carefully and thoughtfully, and to keep a strict account of all expenditures. When a child is unaccustomed to handling money, when he or she gets a little it will probably "burn a hole in their pockets," as the old saying goes. It is all foolishness to think that a young boy cannot buy his own neckties or a girl her handkerchiefs. What if they do not buy wisely, and make mistakes? They can be taught to profit by such mistakes, and they will also learn self-reliance, which is a very important attribute. Give your child the chance and see how important and ambitious it will make him. Children like to be trusted, and very seldom betray a real confidence.
