FLAG FROM KINGSTON

ATTRACTION IN OLD WESTMINSTER ABBEY IN ENGLAND.

The Canadian Battery, Bateria in Henry VII's Chapel—Historic Setting for the Kingston Colors.

Writing from London, Eng., to the Toronto Telegram, Douglas S. Robertson says:

Its silken folds draped against the delicate bronze grill-work that surrounds the tomb of the Royal founder, the flag of the Kingston Battery of the Canadian artillery is now the centre of attraction in King Henry VII's chapel, Westminster Abbey.

Just behind the high altar rests the regimental banner. And here in this ancient sanctuary, this hallowed shrine of the empire, the banner will be guarded till Canada's sons return from the war.

In the twilight that filters through stained glass and dim old lozenge-shaped panes, the writer stood in this beautiful chapel this morning. Overhead, wrought in stone, sixty feet above the marble floor, is that arched roof, whose fairy tracery is the chief glory of the place. All around in the little side chapels lie effigies of the Royal dead, modelled in bronze, carved in ivory-like alabaster. High on a block of marble rests Mary, Queen of Scots. Hard by, aquiline in feature, her long slender hands folded in prayer, lies Margaret Beaufort, mother of Henry VII. Her good deeds live after. After four centuries this queen's bounty is still enjoyed, and every Saturday morning forty old women—just as she had decreed—receive each a gift of a loaf of bread, a piece of meat and two pence.

Fighting to Save It.

"Ah, this will interest you especially," exclaimed a black-gowned vergor of the Abbey. He beckoned to a Canadian soldier who, with a blue-uniformed Belgian cavalryman was visiting the chapel. "We'll guard it faithfully till your gunners come back to claim it. You know you, too, among other things, are fighting to protect this grand old cathedral from the Hun."

In stately company is the Canadian battle flag. It rests in that position of Henry's sanctuary known as the chapel of the Knights of the Bath. A blaze of color—reds, blues, orange and green, black and white, in strange heraldic devices—the banners of the knights hang down each side of the sanctuary, their top stalls are carved oak black with the centuries. Surrounding the lofty back to each seat is a miniature sword and the helmet of the occupant, bearing the colored crest—a swan, a mailed fist, a boar's head, or the like—which distinguishes medieval knights on the battlefield.

One stall at the end stands apart from the rest. The helmet above it is crested with the golden lion of England, and a huge banner the imposing emblematry of the United Kingdom. That is the King's seat. Opposite it, in the rows of stalls facing the east end, there sits the Royal emblem. As Grand Master of the order, the Duke of Connaught, Canada's Governor-General, sits there on state occasions.

Great soldiers have sat in those historic chairs. Here the Duke of Wellington's armorial bearings are blazoned on the ancient woodwork and over an adjacent stall hangs the banner of Lord Roberts.

Thus, in the age-old Abbey, amid the effigies of crusading knights and the tombs of great statesmen and dauntless warriors, the Canadian colors rest.
