HAS TRAVELLED MUCH

W. M. CUNNINGHAM A VISITOR IN THE CITY.

He has Visited Thirty-Two Countries and Has Been Over the War Zone—Came to Canada From New Zealand.

W. M. Cunningham, who is stopping in the city, has had a very wide experience all over the world and has visited thirty-two countries. Foster Fraser, who some time ago visited Canada and wrote a book on his impressions visited only a few more.

Some eight years ago, Mr. Cunningham and his uncle, also of New Zealand, made an extensive tour through Europe and Asia, travelling all over the countries now at war. In passing through the Dardanelles, Mr. Cunningham said that he remembered these famous Straits as being only about eight miles long, with forts on each side and the country to be very rocky in places. The forts were built on concrete concrete on the sides of the hills.

Via Paris, London, Ireland he went to Iceland and returning travelled from Brussels to Vladivostok. The country in Belgium is low and flat, and he said it was similar though more densely populated than from Peterboro to Belleville.

Berlin was a wonderful city and differed greatly from Moscow. The trip through Siberia took thirteen days and fourteen nights. Mr. Cunningham told the Whig representative that under good government Siberia would be another Canada. There are tremendous possibilities there with untold mineral wealth, and it is decidedly not the bleak, barren country as generally thought.

Mr. Cunningham came to Canada from New Zealand last year, leaving the day of the declaration of war. His ship the Marama, in coming to Canada travelled through countries never before touched by a liner. He is a very interesting conversationalist, and has countless incidents that happened on his varied trips. He is a thorough Britisher, and remarked, "It takes travelling to realize what a wonderful thing it is to be able to say that Britain rules the waves."

The steambarge Jeska, that ran on a shoal in the Bay of Quinte the latter end of last week and sank, was brought to Kingston on Friday night and now lies at Sowards' wharf awaiting to go into Davis dry dock to undergo repairs. On Monday afternoon, May 3rd, the boat was raised by the Donnelly Wrecking and Salvage Company and towed to Trenton where her cargo of coal was discharged. Several planks and three frames were saved. Outside of this it is expected that the steambarge will come off very light in the extent of damage done to its hull.

The Phosphate Trade.

The phosphate trade is coming up again with the States, and Perth being right in the phosphate zone, J. H. Adam Co. are shipping five cars, says the Courier. They have some good ore taken from Philip White's farm in Burgess which tests 85 per cent. It is expected that the C. P. R. will make a special rate on feldspar and phosphate, and if it does it will encourage the industry here.
