DIPLOMAS WERE GIVEN

THE GRADUATE NURSES OF THE GENERAL HOSPITAL.

At Commencement Exercises Held In Grant Hall On Friday Night—Principal Gordon Addressed the Graduates.

"There are two very special qualifications for the service of nurse. They are also the supreme qualifications for the soldier, and the qualifications we need in every rank of life—that we do our duty, that we are possessed by the spirit of service.

There are few callings that express that spirit of service more clearly and more admirably than that of the nurse.

The above was one of the outstanding remarks of Principal Gordon, in addressing the graduate nurses of the Kingston General Hospital for 1915, at the twenty-seventh annual commencement exercises of the Training School for nurses here in Grant Hall, on Friday evening.

In his address, Mayor Sutherland gave some interesting history in connection with the establishment of the training school of the hospital. He said that prior to 1886, the great need for such a school had been felt. 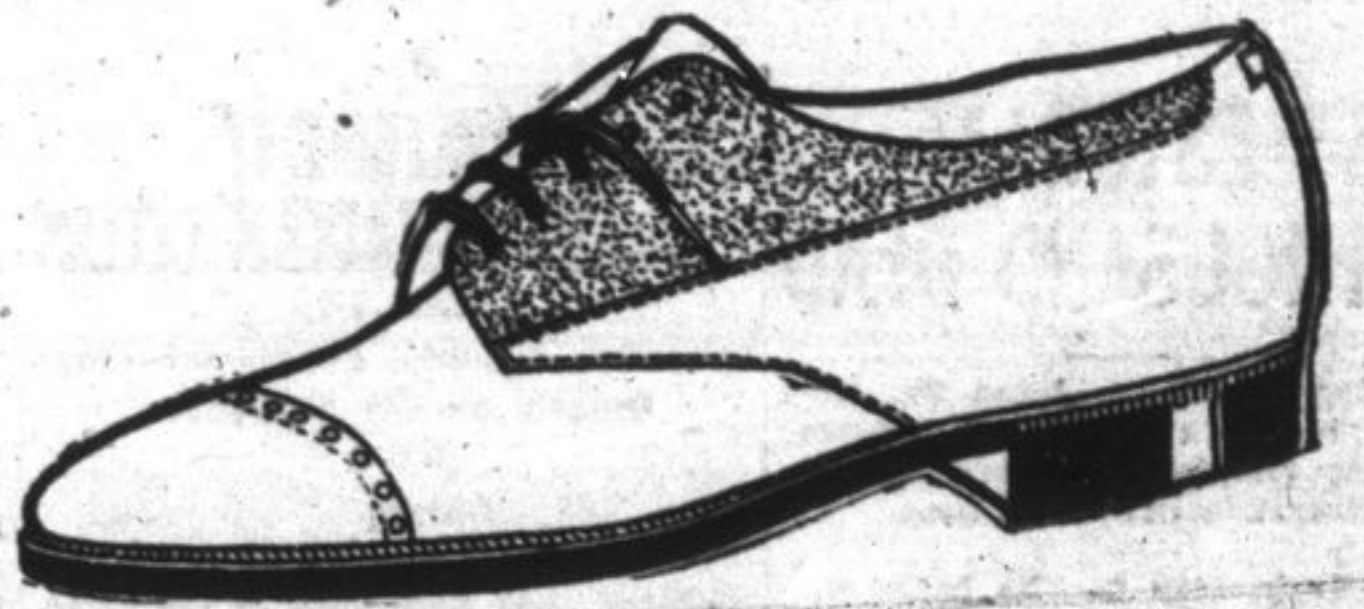

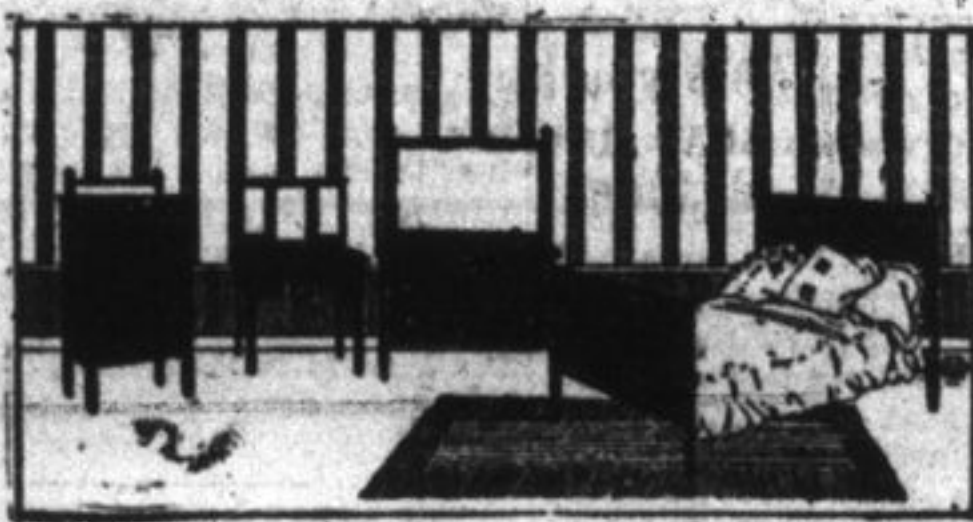
