



### WORK OF THE CHURCH PENITENTIARY RULES

MEN ARE AT FRONT.

Part-War Not Due To the Failure of Christianity. "The war is not due to the failure

of Christianity; It is due to the failure of the world in that it has never truly accepted Christianity. It is due to its failure to live up to the teaching of the Christ; to its disloyal withdrawal of even that partial homage which once it rendered to Him must become believers in Him, must become followers of Him, must obey His laws, fulfill His commandments, honor His word, follow His example, make Him Lord and King over our individual municipal, federal and Imperial life.

"Let us in season and out of season warn men of the absolute folly peace in any other way. All schemes, plans and devices for universal peace are doomed to absolute failure unless the world submits to Christ and so qualifies itself to receive His plessing and peace."

The above are extracts from the ascensiontide Appeal, for Canadian missions issued by the House of Bishops, which was read in Anglican officials. churches in Kingston on Sunday. "Every Canadian loves the land

of his birth or of his "adoption," reads another portion of the appeal. "Every Canadian wishes Canada to carded as impracticable.
