A LIVE SUNDAY SCHOOL

QUEEN STREET METHODIST ANNUAL MEETING

Considers Question of Holding the Annual Picnic or Giving the Proceeds To the Belgian Relief Fund.

The annual meeting of the Queen Street Methodist Sunday School Board was held on Monday evening with the pastor, Rev. G. I. Campbell, in the chair. There was a large attendance of representatives. The business of the evening was proceeding by a supper.

The school has all the departments organized for modern and efficient service. The enrollment of pupils, outside of the home department, and Cradle roll, is 462 and with the cradle roll and home department added, 513.

The reports from some departments were inspiring. These show that the heads of them were putting into the work the energy which was necessary to make of them a success. The organized classes submitted reports which showed that they were not only developing a large interest in the school itself, but that they were devoting their time to a number of outside events which were very worthy of their support.

The library has undergone a complete revision. At present there are about 1,500 volumes in the very best condition. The annual meeting voted a considerable sum for a further replenishment of this department.

The meetings of the Young Men's Club were decidedly attractive through the able addresses of Dr. Coleman, Dean of the Faculty of Education. Other addresses were made by representative citizens, and all had a tendency to make the meetings very attractive and interesting.

Various contributions were made for benevolent purposes, and the school has under consideration the question of devoting to the Belgian Relief Fund the cost of a picnic, or to contribute to the Belgian Relief Fund and continue the picnic. The holding of a picnic, to some children, is practically the event of the summer season, and their interests are worthy of consideration.

The report of the secretary closes as follows: "The school has been fortunate in having its leadership in strong and capable hands, and it can look forward, hopefully to another year of successful service. Every department has been made efficient. The first step towards new accommodation have been taken, and we look forward with confidence to the occupation of the new premises in the near future. The equipment of the school has also been improved in various ways. The library staff has been reorganized, and there is no doubt that Queen Street Sunday School will maintain its record with steady and aggressive service."

The officers of the school were re-elected.

At eight o'clock the City Hall will be the scene of the formal reception. The third degree will be exemplified. After which a banquet will be served. The City Hall is being used as the lodge rooms are not large enough for the number who will be present.

Farmers Want Help.

First-class farm help in very scarce at present. George Hunter could place thirty good men on farms if he could secure men to do the work. Men leaving for the war have made help scarce.

Brought Prisoner Back.

Chief Keeper Atkins of the penitentiary returned from the West on Monday afternoon with a convict who violated his parole and will have to serve out the balance of his term.

Picture of Kingston Colors.

Peppitt with the 22nd Battery now in England, a copy of the London Star of April 24th on the front page of which appears a large cut of the flag presented to the 22nd Battery by the Kingston Veterans' Association. The picture shows the flag hanging in Westminster Abbey.

Stock Prices Advance.

The New York stock market opened on Tuesday with a jump. Prices were from two to five points up, and better than on Saturday. There was a big drop on Monday owing to the unfounded rumor that President Wilson was assassinated. Some Kingston men cleaned up some money on the market as a result.

Firemen Were Called Out.

Hot water pipes at the home of George Rose, 96 Barrack street, caused a great deal of excitement but very little damage about 10.15 o'clock on Tuesday morning. The firemen were given a call and in short order had everything in order again. Sussman & Cohen own the house.

READY TO ESTABLISH

A Hospital Here For the Wounded Who Return.

Arrangements for taking care of the soldiers invalidated home from the front are now complete. If necessary a hospital of 100 beds will be established either in a building or, if the weather is suitable, in tents. The equipment for a hospital has been received and is now in the stores waiting to be issued as soon as necessary.

There are only one or two men in Kingston who were really at the front and were invalidated home. These men are being attended to when necessary by the medical officers. Generally it is the case that invalidated soldiers do not require much medical attention, and so far none have arrived that needed hospital attention. If there should be several sent home who are really in need of it the 100-bed hospital will be established.

The military authorities have been very considerate in allowing to come home all men who are unfit for further service. These men could be treated in the base hospitals or in England and then returned home by sending them to Canada, but as soon as they are ready for the trip they are granted their transportation so that they can recuperate at or near their own homes.

ALD. GRAHAM REPRIMANDED.

Ald. Wright For Saying Steam Instead of Dollars.

When the City Council was discussing the garbage incinerator question on Monday night, Ald. Graham put this question to Ald. Wright, chairman of the committee: "What are you going to make?" "Steam," was the innocent reply of Ald. Wright.

"Now you know well enough that is not what I meant, Ald. Wright. I have served twelve years in this Council and if you expect to do better work than I have done you'll have to get up pretty early in the morning."

"I answered your question," said Ald. Wright.

"But that's not what I want to know. How much money are you going to make out of this incinerator?"

"We expect to make \$1,400. That is the amount the Utilities Commission proposes to pay us for the steam," was the reply of the chairman of the Garbage Committee.

McGwin got locked up but his pal managed to escape. The Magistrate fined McGwin \$1, and costs or ten days.

KINGSTON TO PROVIDE

FOR EDUCATION OF CHILDREN OF SOLDIERS KILLED

Or Completely Disabled in the War—Ald. Nickle's Resolution Adopted by the City Council.

The City Council will provide for the education of all children of Kingston soldiers killed or completely disabled in the war. This was decided upon Monday night when the following resolution moved by Ald. Nickle, was adopted:

"That the Mayor be instructed to appoint a committee to consider and report upon a scheme for providing free education through the Collegiate Institute for children of soldiers killed or completely disabled while on active service, the soldiers to have been residents of Kingston when they enlisted."

Ald. Nickle said that as one of the Canadian Patriotic Fund Committee having charge of the payment of money to the families of soldiers serving overseas, he had noted that the mothers had on their mind the education of their children should the fathers be killed or permanently disabled. Widows of soldiers would receive less than half what they were getting, as the pension fund would give them \$22 a month for themselves and \$5 for each child. Ald. Nickle said that it was the duty of a municipality to look after the children and see that they were properly educated.

The resolution was carried unanimously, and a report will likely be presented at the next meeting of Council.

FOR THE KING'S BIRTHDAY

Committee Are Arranging For A Big Celebration.

There will be a meeting of the King's Birthday Celebration Committee on Wednesday evening. The different committees will make reports and show what arrangements are being made for the celebration. The horse-racing committee is planning a very extensive programme. Last year the horses made some excellent records and even better time is expected this year. An extra large purse is being offered and this will act as an inducement for the best horses to be brought here.

The sports committee is also planning an excellent programme. There will be motor-boat races, athletic events and baseball matches all morning. The afternoon events will be, of course, at the Fair grounds and here will be motor-cycle races, horse races, a wrestling match, baseball games and other attractions.

If "C" Battery and the 26th Battery can be secured, several important military events will be arranged. It is to be hoped that the citizens will do well as formally toward making the celebration a success by decorating their stores and houses for the occasion. The huge military camps at Barrisfield will add to the attraction and thousands of visitors will be here.
