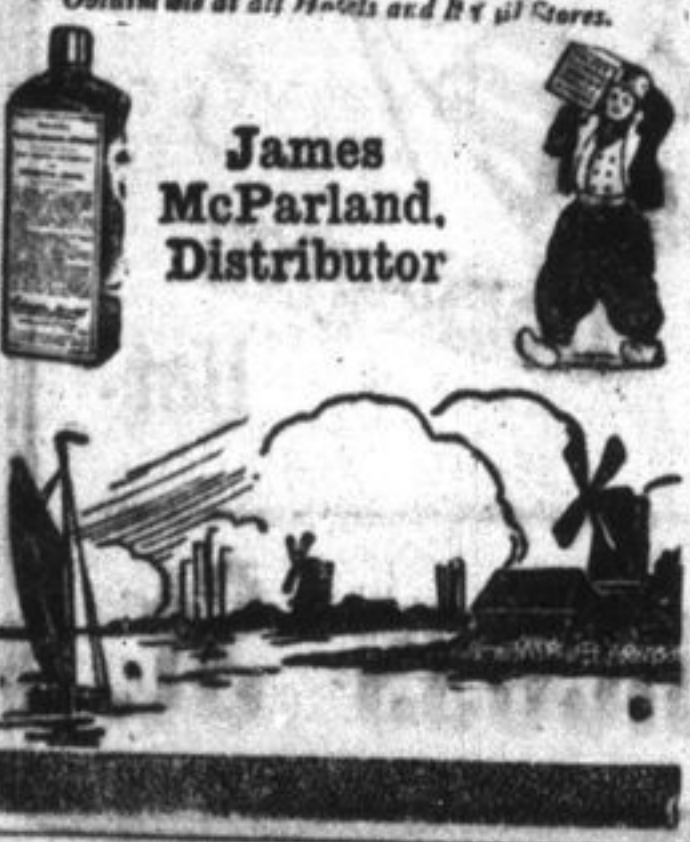

GERMANS SEEK NEWS.

Ask Russians When They Think War Will End.

Petrograd, May 12.—An officer serving in East Prussia gives an interesting account of a recent friendly talk between Russian and German soldiers during a three hours' armistice for the collection and burial of the dead who lay between the trenches.

The Germans were glad to exchange cigarettes and chocolate for bread and butter and sugar. They said they were kept very short of these and were often hungry. The Russian soldiers in their warm greatcoats pitied many of the German shivering in the bitter spring wind. The Germans were wearing different kinds of uniforms. Some were well clad, while others were insufficiently protected and had no smartness left, while their self-assurance was all gone—a great change remarks an officer, since the attitude even of the prisoners since the beginning of the war.

Several German soldiers asked eagerly, "When will the war end?" Officers as well as men gathered round to hear what the Russian captain thought. His reply, interpreted by Poles acquainted with both Russian and German, was: "Not before August at the earliest." This caused great disappointment, and one man flung his helmet on the ground in despondent anger.

The Germans were surprised to see that the Russian trenches were well and regularly supplied with newspapers, and said they were not allowed to receive any themselves. The character of the information supplied to the German army may be judged from their belief that only 40,000 Austrians were captured at Przemyel. When all were convinced that the number was three as many the Germans called the Austrians old women and said that if the garrison had been Germans it would never have been taken.

DRAPED KAISER'S GIFT.

Harvard Students Put Inscription on Brunswick Lion. Cambridge, Mass., May 12.—Harvard's Brunswick lion, a gift from the German Kaiser, was found draped in mourning. A large sheet was wound around the statue, which stands in front of the Germanic Museum, the edges of the sheet being black. Two inscriptions were scrawled on the covering in large bold letters. One of them read:

"One hundred and forty-seven corpses; another gift from the Kaiser."

The other was: "In memory of the Lusitania massacre, and was signed 'Humanity.' The draping was said to be the work of undergraduates.

WAR COUNCIL AT VIENNA.

Kaiser Going Incognito To Meet Francis Joseph. Rome, May 12.—Prince von Bellow, the German ambassador to Italy, confided to a friend yesterday his fears that he will be compelled to leave Rome Tuesday or Wednesday, adding, however, that it was not impossible that his departure will be postponed for a week.

Circumstantial reports are in circulation in Government circles that Italy's time limit during which Austria must make a satisfactory reply to her demands expires at midnight.

If Austria has not conceded everything asked for by that time, the reports say, all negotiations will be broken off.

Italian officials refuse to confirm the reports, but it is certain that matters are again approaching a crisis.

The destruction of the Lusitania has resulted in many of the newspapers, hitherto lukewarm in their support of war suggestions, changing their attitude. Many of them now say that it is only a question of time when an Italian steamer will be torpedoed, and the Government is urged to take immediate action against Austria.

An uncensored despatch from Vienna says that a war council in preparation for Italian intervention is to be held at once. It will be presided over jointly by Emperor Francis Joseph and the Kaiser. The latter is now in the Carpathians, according to the despatch, and is going to Vienna incognito.
