**IN MARINE CIRCLES**

**MORE TROUBLE OVER LOW WATER IN ST. LAWRENCE**

Very Difficult to Get Launch Boats Out on Account of the Shallow Water—Movements of Vessels Reported.

Low water in the St. Lawrence has been a great drawback to navigation so far this season. A despatch from Clayton says that there is no chance of its rising very materially, and adds:

"Boatmen are experiencing much trouble in getting their boats in and out of their boat houses, especially those who own fishing boats and haul them into the houses. Quite a few boat houses, which have had water nearly up to their floors in former years are now away out of water, and the docks are altogether too high for comfort in getting in or out of boats."

"One or two parties, who have every year hauled their boats into shallow water, are this season experiencing trouble in getting their craft into deeper water. Shoals which ordinarily are good spots for fishing during the summer are now showing their rocks above water, and boats are not able to go where they have heretofore been able to travel."

**MANY CASES IN COURT.**

**Magistrate Farrell Had a Busy Time On Saturday.**

Magistrate Farrell had a busy time of it on Saturday morning, there being no less than twelve cases on the docket.

George Watts had a very narrow escape from death, and at the same time landed in the police cells. Under the influence of liquor Friday night he drove in front of a street car on Princess street. The buggy in which he was riding was badly damaged, and he was thrown out on to the road, but escaped serious injury. As he had been before the court just a few days ago for drunkenness, he was fined \$3 and costs of twenty days.

The police are bound to stop speeding. The stop watch has been the means of bringing many speeders to time. Constable Arnold used his watch on two drivers, and the Magistrate imposed a fine of \$5 and costs on each. One offender pleaded that his speedometer was out of business, whereupon he was told by the Magistrate to get it fixed.

Five drunks were in the lineup and a small fine was imposed on each. A carter who allowed paper to scatter on the street was fined, his assistant warned, two other cases for a breach of the by-law were enlarged, and a citizen who fired off a gun last Sunday to shoot a neighbor's dog was fined \$2 and costs.

**21ST BATTALION REACHES ENGLAND.**

The 21st Battalion and the Queen's Stationary Hospital, which sailed from Montreal on the SS. Metagama on the morning of the 6th of May, reached England at 11 a. m. Saturday, a cable announcing the safe arrival of the good ship was received by Richard Ludlow, Arch street, from his son Quarter Master Sergeant Francis K. Ludlow, 21st Battalion, and good news that the Metagama had crossed the ocean and evaded the German submarines was received with great joy.

The 21st Battalion and the Hospital unit left Kingston on the night of Wednesday, May 5th, and embarked at Montreal the next morning. The Metagama made a good passage.

The 21st will likely proceed at once to Shorncliffe camp for brigade training, and the Queen's Hospital Corps will be sent to France as soon as arrangements can be made.

**NO WORD YET RECEIVED.**

With regard to the opening of Barrfield Camp.

Up to the present no word has yet been received from Ottawa about the opening of Barrfield Camp and the advance parties cannot be brought in before the middle of the week, which will make the opening date at least the end of next week. The militia authorities at Ottawa are working strenuously to keep up the routine work and have not yet had time to consider the Barrfield Camp details.

There is absolutely no doubt but that the 8th Regiment, C.M.R., 7th Artillery Brigade, 88th Battalion and the overseas volunteers in the division will be in camp, but arrangements for transportation have not yet been made. There is sure to be 4,000 men under canvas. It is unlikely that the 14th Regiment Home Guard will be under canvas.

**GERMANS HAD PLOT**

To Block St. Lawrence With the Steamer Rosemont.

During the week efforts were made by men said to be German agents, to purchase the steamer Rosemont of the Montreal Transportation Company, but they were unsuccessful.

**FIVE MORE MISSING**

**AMONG THE KINGSTON MEMBERS OF SECOND BATTALION.**

The Battle of Langemarck continues to field casualties that are only now being reported.

Reports of five more Kingston members of the Second Battalion, C. E. F., being missing as a result of the battle of Langemarck and the fighting near Ypres, reached the soldiers' homes on Saturday morning. The following is the list:

Pte. Thomas Hancock.

Two little children at the Orphans' Homes were told some very bad news on Saturday morning. Their mother is dead, and their father, Pte. Thomas Hancock, who was a painter, and lived on Brock street, left for the front with the 14th Regiment company of the 2nd Battalion, and since the battle of Langemarck has been missing.

**Pte. Thomas Stephenson.**

Mrs. A. Stephenson, of Pembroke street, received a telegram from the Adjutant-General at Ottawa on Saturday morning that her son, Pte. Thomas Stephenson, 2nd Battalion, C.E.F., had been officially reported as missing after the battle of Langemarck. Pte. Stephenson was only eighteen years of age, and had been attending Victoria School before enlisting. His brother, Samuel Stephenson, is now overseas with the 21st Battalion.

**Pte. Lawrence Shangrove.**

Mrs. Shangrove, 22 Elgin street, received a telegram on Saturday that her son, Lawrence, who was a private in Capt. G. T. Richardson's company of the 2nd Battalion, was officially reported missing. He was a sailor last summer previous to enlisting, and is twenty years of age.

**Pte. Robert Hughes.**

Word was received on Saturday from Ottawa by his parents that Pte. Robert Hughes, 2nd Battalion, who fought with the detachment from the 14th Regiment, was reported as missing after the famous battle of Langemarck. His father is employed at the Knitting Mill, and resides at 299 Division street.

**Lance-Corpl. Holthan.**

A telegram was received on Saturday from the Adjutant-General at Ottawa informing his wife, 64 Markland street, that Lance-Corpl. William Holthan, overseas with the 14th Regiment company of the Second Battalion, is missing. No particulars were given, and it is supposed that he was captured with a number of other Kingstonsians whose names are now being given out as missing. He is probably a prisoner-of-war in Germany. Corp. Holthan was a laborer, and his wife and four children reside with his mother on Markland street.
