REBELS HAD VISIONS

SOUTH AFRICAN "BLUE PAPER" TELLS AMAZING STORY.

Lichtenburg Seer's Experiences Had Much to Do With the Rising of De la Rey, De Wet, Maritz, Beyers and Others—Under Roof of Prophet Conspiracy Was Ha.che—He Urged the Rebels to Wait.

The South African "Blue Paper" is out. It is unique—romantic. In the third paragraph of the very first page of this weighty document, which deals with the recent rebellion, is the following unusual sentence: "It is not surprising, then, that in the ferment aroused by the gigantic struggle in Europe, Africa seemed to be shaking the world to its foundations, young men began to see visions and old men to dream dreams of what the outcome might be for South Africa."

And this is followed by a still stranger passage: "The times were not without their signs. There was a seer in Lichtenburg who had vision of strange import. Years ago and long before any one in this country had dreamed of war, he beheld great fight of bulls, six or seven of them, engaged in bloody combat; a gray bull had emerged victorious from the contest. "The bulls signified the great nations of Europe, and the gray bull was Germany. Thousands and thousands in this country had dreamed of war, he remembered its prophetic character when, later, war actually broke out. The vision seemed ominous. Germany was predestined to triumph."

The seer is Nikolaas van Rensburg, and he runs through this Government report like a seer's thread through a gray homespun. It is around his influence that the uprising of September 15 is built. It is under his roof that all manner of lurid conspiracies are hatched. No only do his words carry with the crowd that gather before his house to hear his prophecy, but his warnings shape the actions of some of the Transvaal generals. The Government report will not go so far as to brand "Oom Nikolaas" as a h.a.c. Says the preface:

"It is desired to point out that the narrative of events has been compiled in an objective manner, as possible, and that it contains no statement which is not borne out by evidence in possession of the Government."

His most famous and most influential prophecy, the one that will go down in the history of South Africa, was that which concerned Gen. de la Rey and the fatal number 15. This prophecy which came back to the minds of van Rensburg's followers when war broke out was one concerning General de la Rey, who had commanded the Lichtenburg burghers in the Boer war and become president of the "Weera Transvaal Farmers' Association. Van Rensburg had always admired Gen. de la Rey. He had frequently hinted to his circle that great things were in store for him. One of his visions had been well known to Gen. de la Rey and his friends for some years. The report says: "The seer had beheld the number 15 on a dark cloud, from which blood issued, and then Gen. de la Rey returning home without his hat, immediately after the war, a carriage covered with flowers."

This was several years ago. But the people did not forget the prophecy, and when war broke out in Europe the Western Transvaal—in the Lichtenburg-Wolmaranstad area, where van Rensburg was the strongest—was immediately aflame. The Government does not seek to minimize the importance of this influence:

"When the war at last broke out the effect in Lichtenburg was instantaneous. The prophecy of an Rensburg were recalled, and it was remembered that he had foretold a day on which the independence of the Transvaal would be restored: "Certain individuals could be seen daily cleaning their rifles and cartridges in order to be ready for the day. Within a week of the declaration of war between Great Britain and Germany the district was further profoundly stirred by the news (now become generally known) that a great meeting of local burghers was to be held at Teyatefontein on the 15th of August, and that certain local officers were commanding their burghers to come to this meeting armed and fully equipped for active service."

The outbreak of the war in Europe suddenly brought the Lichtenburg seer's prophecy down to earth and crystallized the dream. The commandants were evidently so convinced that independence was at hand as the crowd.

General Louis Botha, Premier of the South African Union, summoned General de la Rey to Pretoria some days before the meeting, and persuaded him to use his best efforts to allay excitement.

On the 15th the meeting was held. The situation was a tense one. No one of the burghers present doubted the outcome. Yet General de la Rey exhorted them to remain cool and calm. He urged them to await the turn of events in Europe. After his address a "strange and unusual silence" was observed, says the "Blue Paper."

"A resolution was passed unanimously expressing complete confidence in the Government to act in the best interests of South Africa in the present world crisis. The burghers appeared to have taken their leader's advice to heart, as they dispersed quietly to their homes. All danger of a rebellious movement had apparently been averted.

FINANCIAL MATTERS.

What the Granby Consolidated Directors Have Learned. Boston, May 14.—When the Granby Consolidated directors hold their May meeting it will be with the knowledge that the company's floating debt has been cared for, leaving resumption of dividends a possible topic of discussion. The general belief is that the former quarterly rate of \$1.50 will be restored and paid in June. During the first quarter of 1915 Granby, from its two properties, produced nearly 7,000,000 pounds of copper, an amount far in excess of any previous records. Neither smelter was worked to capacity in that period.

Vanderbilt's Estate. New York, May 14.—A. G. Vanderbilt is estimated to have left estate from \$75,000,000 to \$100,000,000, largely in real estate. He had \$20,000,000 invested in New York Central Realty and Terminal Co., and was sole owner of Vanderbilt Hotel, valued at \$4,000,000.

No Dividend Change. Montreal, May 14.—Directors of the two English concerns, which have been loaded up with war orders since the outbreak of hostilities—Vickers, Limited, and Armstrong-Whitworth, have made no change in their dividend payments. Nor has the stock of either concern leapt skywards on war order news.

Hollinger Dividend. Toronto, May 14.—Dividend No. 34 of the Hollinger Mines for 4 per cent. payable May 20th, brings the Hollinger dividend table to 107 per cent., or a total disbursement of \$3,210,000. Since January the company has paid in dividends \$600,000, or 20 per cent. compared of five dividends of 4 per cent.

Maple Leaf's Best. Toronto, May 14.—The annual report of the Maple Leaf Mining Company, which is as yet in the hands of the auditors, is stated by an interest in close touch with the company to be the best by far in its history. The figures will not, however, be made public until the annual meeting, which will be held the last week of May.

Canadian Cottons. Montreal, May 14.—The annual statement of Canadian Cottons, Ltd., for the year ending March 31st shows total revenue amounting to \$573,877, a decrease of \$29,065. After meeting charges allowing for bad debts a balance of \$133,937 remains to be carried forward to surplus account which now stands at \$1,163,163.

A Heavy Deficit. Philadelphia, May 14.—Pennsylvania Steel Company reports a deficit of \$678,491 for last year, against a surplus of \$630,644 in 1913. Income from operation was \$1,276,208, a decrease of \$1,487,923. Earnings equalled 1.1-10 per cent., on the preferred stock, against 8-4-5 per cent. in 1913.

Commercial Notes. The province of Ontario recently sold at private sale \$1,000,000 5 per cent. five-year debentures at 100.35. The railroads of the United States during the last fiscal year paid \$1,273,472 in wages.

The tendency towards improvement that has been observable in U. S. railroad gross earnings for some weeks past is apparently well maintained.

The Dominion Bridge Company had, during the latter half of last week, booked two bridge orders involving the outlay of \$1,000,000.

A leading authority declares that the United States is capable of sustaining six hundred million people and Canada four hundred million people.

The outstanding feature of the Montreal Stock Exchange on Wednesday was the strength shown by Hollinger, which sold up to \$27.50 as compared with \$25.50 on Tuesday.
