**THE REPORTS TOLD OF A GOOD YEAR'S WORK.**

Special Thanks Tendered Frederick Welch for Raising Funds Last Year to Renovate the Building.

The annual meeting of the Young Women's Christian Association was held on Tuesday evening in the Association parlors, and the reports read all told of a year of good work. The president, Mrs. R. Carr-Harris, laid emphasis upon the enlarging of the Y. W. C. A. quarters by the addition of another flat, thereby making ample accommodation for several other bedrooms. To do this necessary renovating required resources, and Mrs. Carr-Harris expressed thanks where it was most due. She specially mentioned the name of Frederick Welch, who, although in ill health last fall, made a personal canvass among the citizens to raise the desired amount to carry out the aims of this rapidly growing institution. Mrs. Carr-Harris also thanked those ladies who had so ably given their services through both rain and storm to build up the class work as well as the spiritual work. "We are not confined to any denomination or sect," said the speaker, "but we all meet together as a sisterhood and associate with any class."

Before taking her seat Mrs. Carr-Harris introduced Mrs. C. Cochrane, who heartily thanked the president and audience for being allowed to speak a few words of cheer. Mrs. Cochrane has always been a faithful follower of Y. W. C. A. work.

The report of Miss Lillian Knowles, the general secretary, was very comprehensive. An outline of it will be given later.

Canon Fitzgerald in his address aimed at the cementing of a closer relation among Canadian, English, Irish and Scotch citizens. "Where are the English, Scotch and Irish people we formerly beheld on our streets?" said the speaker. In answer he stated most of them have gone overseas to fight the battle against militarism and despotism, and are now side by side with Canadians, and also called the same. Canon Fitzgerald appealed to the young ladies to carry out the "Red Cross" work and keep the necessary material flowing into the hospitals of France, Belgium and England.

Rev. Dr. Ryckman gave some good advice. He also had the pleasure of awarding prizes to the Misses Anna Wilson and May Smith for regular attendance at the Bible class. The prizes were beautiful Bibles donated by Mrs. D. Ross.

Rev. G. I. Campbell was called upon to speak and after thanking Miss Knowles and others for their splendid reports, he spoke of how we should all devote our service to our Master, Jesus Christ.

J. G. Elliott was the final speaker. Before the business part of the meeting, supper was served, to which almost one hundred sat down. Throughout the evening vocal solos were rendered by Miss M. Chalmers, piano solos by Mrs. A. R. B. Williamson; piano duets by Mrs. A. De Larrush and her sister, Miss Alice Frasco.

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**TO ALTER THE BY-LAW**

**SO THAT PORTICOS MAY BE CONSTRUCTED.**

Over the Street Line if City Engineer Sees Fit—Board of Works Decides To Rebuild Brock Street Roadway.

The Board of Works is going to befriend those citizens who have the misfortune to own property on which houses are built right on the street line, and who cannot construct porticos. For the past nine or ten years there has been a by-law in force which prohibited any constructions over the street line. Kingston is an old city, and in the long ago it was fashionable to build right on the street line, retaining all the space possible in the rear. Nowadays the fashion is to have the garden plot in front of the house, and a portico or verandah to sit upon during the warm weather. There are scores of houses that cannot have these luxuries. Even the present chairman of the Board of Works, Ald. C. J. Graham, when he defied the by-law some years ago and built porticos in front of old houses he was remodeling was haled before the police magistrate and fined.

Year in and year out applications come before the Board of Works for permission to erect porticos or steps over the street line, but the by-law is in the way. However, this year's Board of Works is going to have compassion upon owners of old houses. It discussed the matter at length yesterday afternoon when the application of J. P. Hanley for permission to use a couple of feet over the street line for the erection of a portico in front of a dwelling he owns on Gore street came before it.

Ald. Richardson thought that porticos might be an adornment to a street instead of a detriment. He was in favor of considering each case on its merits.

"How many places do you own with porticos over the street line, Mr. Chairman?" Ald. Richardson asked.

"None," replied Ald. Graham, "I sold them all, but if I had owned that needed porticos and I had not the space for them, I would go ahead and build them notwithstanding the by-law. I did it before and I would do it again. I favor giving people permission to build over the street line in exceptional cases and charging a yearly rental for the ground used."

Ald. O'Connor thought the by-law should be changed and not made so drastic.

Ald. Couper was of the same opinion and he moved that the by-law be amended giving the City Engineer power to grant permission to erect porticos or steps over the street line where he saw fit to do so. This motion was adopted.

Brock Street Roadway.

The City Engineer reported that the Utilities Manager had informed him that Brock street was in pretty good condition for paving so far as his departments were concerned. Only seven or eight services had to be put in.

It was decided to macadamize Brock street between Barrie and Alfred streets under the Local Improvement plan, and also to treat it with tarvia B, the same kind of oil put on Upper Princess street. Brock street from Bagot to Barrie will be repaired and also treated with tarvia B. The work on that thoroughfare will be started as soon as possible.

The feeling of the members of the Board seemed to be that macadam treated with tarvia was plenty good enough for any residential street. When it was considered satisfactory for Brock street on which the traffic is greater than on Princess street, Aids. Nickle and Graham thought it was good enough for University avenue.

"A resident of University Avenue told me that he did not care what we put down up there so long as we gave them a good roadway," said Ald. Graham.

May Oil Camp Road.

A communication was received from Col. T. D. R. Hemming, who will command the Barrie Road asking that the roadway from the end of the bridge to the camp ground on the Heights be oiled so as to keep down the dust. The camp would likely continue all summer if the war went on.

The City Engineer reported that it would cost \$400 to keep the roadway watered. It could be given a coat of oil for the same amount.

It was finally decided that the chairman of the City Engineer should consult with the County Road Superintendent, R. H. Fair, and see what should be done. The roadway is in Pittsburg township, running through Government property.

The Board will reply to certain Victoria ward residents, who petitioned for redress in regard to the dumping of refuse on vacant lots near them, that the city has abated the nuisance on city property, but it has no authority to prevent refuse being dumped on private property, no matter how unsightly it may look.

The City Engineer will be instructed to repair the old asphalt walks running from the corner of Earl and West streets, around to the corner of Clergy and Barrie, and down Barrie to the corner of Union.

**600 MEN EACH MONTH**

WILL BE NEEDED FOR THE 3RD DIVISION.

As Its Share Of Reinforcements — At Present the Recruiting Is Reported as Being Quite Brisk.

An order to form a battalion for overseas service is expected from Ottawa at any time. It has been given out that eight thousand men must be sent every month to the front to act as reinforcements for the Canadian divisions. This means that seven battalions must be recruited every four weeks. As there are thirteen districts and divisions in Canada, this division at its portion must supply about 600 men a month.

The military authorities do not anticipate any trouble, as since the Lusitania outrage great numbers are volunteering. Up to a few days ago recruiting was at a standstill. The order from Col. T. D. R. Hemming, officer commanding the division, to the effect that more men are needed, has been carried out by extensive advertising. As a result men are coming to the front in sufficiently large numbers to give the impression that still larger numbers can be obtained.

The news of a new battalion and the attraction of Barrie Field Camp should greatly stimulate recruiting. The new battalion will be of the same establishment as the 21st, having 1,124 men.

The training at Barrie will be very instructive and should be highly interesting. The three branches of the service—cavalry, artillery and infantry, will be in camp together and complicated tactical schemes may be worked out.
