ORDER TO MOBILIZE SAVED BY A MIRACLE

FOR BARRIEFIELD CAMP HAS BEEN RECEIVED.

The Advance Parties Will Arrive on Saturday, and All the Troops Will Be in Camp Next Tuesday.

The official mobilization order for Barriefield camp was issued on Wednesday morning. There will be between 3,000 and 4,000 men under canvas at the camp of all overseas volunteers, with the exception of the supply corps, such as the Army Service Corps and others. The advance parties will arrive on Saturday, and on Tuesday next every man will be in camp.

The advance parties will be as follows: 8th Regiment, C. M. R., of thirty-five men and an officer; 38th Battalion, fifty men and an officer. The 26th Battery of Kingston will act as advance party to the 7th Artillery Brigade, Ottawa, of which it is a part. The cooks will be part of the advance parties. Queen's University Officers' Training Corps will proceed to camp on Tuesday. The surplus overseas troop now assembled at regimental headquarters of the following units will proceed to camp on the following dates: 14th, 15th, 16th, 40th, 42nd, 43rd, 46th, 47th, 49th, 57th and 59th regiments on Tuesday next. The troops from the 41st Regiment and 56th Regiment will act as advance parties and go into camp on Saturday. The 45th troops, of which there are about 250, will not go into camp until further orders.

The 39th Battalion, Belleville, a short time ago received word to hold itself in readiness to go at any time to the front as reinforcements, and for that reason will not go into camp.

The transportation of the troops is being looked after by Major J. Hamilton, A. D. of S. and T.

The officers of the Royal School of Artillery and "C" Battery paraded to Barriefield on Wednesday and worked out a technical scheme. The battery were supposed to be an attacking force upon Kingston and took as their starting-point Sibbit's farm. From there to the bridge different positions were taken up. In each the guns were laid in position for firing and the horses taken some distance back of the line.

The N. C. O.'s were engaged in section gun drill on Tete de Pont Bar about closing the Royal School of Artillery for the summer, as there is now a large number of qualified officers who have absolutely no chance for commissions owing to the fact that there are no vacancies. Applications are being received every day from all parts of the Dominion. As yet no orders for a fifth class have been received.

The Remount Depot at St. Jean Que., in which are several Kingstonians, is reported to be very busy. Lieut.-Col. Pichie is in command, and has men from all over the Dominion. There are some hundred cowboys from Western Canada in the unit. It was reported on Tuesday that one company had already gone overseas.

In the latest General Orders received is the following notice:

"The sum of \$10 is to be withheld, for a period of six months, from the pay of every man enlisted in or after the 1st of March, 1915, for overseas service. This amount is to provide for the cost of civilian clothing to men discharged within six months of their enlistment, and also to partly compensate the Government for military issues made to men who subsequently desert.

"After six months' service, or on termination of engagement, the amount may be repaid and civilian clothing issued free on discharge."

Corpl. F. Burns, 14th Regiment, P. W. O. R., has been awarded the Colonial Auxiliary Forces Long Service Medal.

Lieut. J. M. Ashby, 47th Regiment, has been granted a provisional lieutenantancy in the 4th Hussars.

Frederick McPhun has been granted a provisional lieutenantancy in the 47th Regiment.

Lieut. Dewey, No. 2 Detachment P. A. S. C., has been appointed adjutant and quartermaster at Barriefield. Capt. J. Walsh, now in Belleville, will likely take over the command of No. 3 Company, A. S. C.

It is understood that two hotels in this district will be put out of bounds to soldiers because the bar-tenders have been serving liquor before six o'clock.

Major K. C. Folger, C.O.C., who is going overseas on the staff of Major General Steele, officer commanding the Second Canadian Contingent, was in the city on Wednesday.

Lieut. E. C. Brandon, 39th Battalion, Belleville, was in the city on Tuesday.

CANADIANS HAVE WON

For Themselves An Everlasting Name," Says Asquith (Special to the Whig.)

London, May 18.—Premier Asquith spoke briefly at the Guild Hall before going to the Commons to-day. In eulogizing the British overseas contingents who came to assistance of England, he declared that "the Canadians have won for themselves in France an everlasting name."

"There is no part of the Empire that would not suffer annihilation rather than become subject to another sovereignty," said Mr. Asquith in his speech.

The fact that Prime Minister emptied only his office and that Sir Edward Grey was taken to mean that the shakeup in the Ministry will become a more violent upheaval than had been reported.

The Premier emphasized the fact the political truce to be declared by the formation of new cabinet is for the period of the war only. The Government, he said, had decided upon this move as an act of patriotism.

HOW PRIVATE S. WILDER ESCAPED DEATH IN BATTLE.

About Only Member Left of Machine Gun Section of Second Battalion—Fought Two Days at Langemarcke Before He Was Wounded.

That it was nothing less than a miracle that saved the life of Private Sherbourne Wilder, son of Mrs. H. S. Wilder, Princess street, who lost an eye in the battle of Langemarcke, is shown in a letter his mother has received from him giving further particulars. The letter was dated May 9th, and was written in the American Woman's Hospital, Paignton, South Devonshire. In the letter he says:

"Dear Mother:—I cannot write much, as I want to save my good eye as much as possible until the other gets better. This hospital is the home of Mr. Singer, the Singer Sewing Machine man. It is a grand place. I am very comfortable and well looked after. All the Canadian hospitals were filled with Canadians who were wounded, and I, with a number of others, was sent here. I am up now and have been for two days, so you will see I am getting on well. They took my left eye out at the base hospital at Rouen, in France, and the hole is healing up fast. If I was a very close shave, and a wonder I did not lose both of them. If the bullet had not glanced off my left eyeball and through my nose I would have lost both eyes. I was very lucky when I did not lose my nose.

"The bullet went right through the nose and never touched the bone and left a little hole, which has healed up. My stomach is healing. The bullet went across my stomach, but did not puncture it. The doctor who attended me said that it was the luckiest thing he had seen yet, and that it was a wonder I was not killed."

"The third bullet made a great scratch on the calf of my leg without breaking the bone.

"I am done for the war now, and I suppose that you are glad of that. I cannot tell you anything about the battle or the pain which I suffered after being wounded and before leaving for England. It will be two months yet before I get home. They are going to get a glass eye for me.

"I think I am the only one left of my machine gun section of the Second Battalion as far as I can see. I have only seen two of the battalion since I was hurt. I took part in the battle of Langemarcke for two days before getting wounded."

REVOLUTION LONG IN AIR.

Plans Laid as Far Back as Last March.

Paris, May 19.—A despatch to the Havas Agency from Lisbon says the project for the revolution in Portugal was formed three days after the constitution last March of the Cabinet of General Pimenta Castro. Dr. Alvaro Castro, the correspondent says, took charge of the military arrangements Antonio Maria Silva undertook to organize the civilians, and Captain Leotte Rego, of the Navy, agreed to command the naval forces.

The Lisbon newspaper states, says the Havas correspondent in the Portuguese capital, that General Pimenta Castro, the President of the Cabinet, declared that when the revolutionary movement broke out he offered the collective resignation of the ministry to President De Arriaga. It is added that General Castro assured the new cabinet of his loyalty.

Two hundred persons killed and five hundred wounded are the reported results of the fighting. Most of the killed and wounded belonged to the Republican Guard.

Admiral Javier Brito has been imprisoned on a charge of having ordered the submarine Espadarte to sink the boats bombarding Lisbon.

War Tidings.

The Danish steamer Rimfaxe, bound for Gedser with a cargo of coal, has been seized by a German warship in the Baltic and taken to Stettin.

The cruiser Breslau, now part of the Turkish fleet, shelled and sank the Bulgarian steamer Varna in the Black Sea while she was enroute from Sulina to Varna.

Successes for the British in German South-West Africa continue in an unbroken series. It is officially announced that a German detachment was defeated at East Windhoek, losing 140 men and twenty-five wagons of supplies. The British casualties were three wounded.

FIND HAVEN AT EMERSON.

Remnant of Unemployed Austrian Army Being Cared For.

Emerson, Man., May 19.—Two hundred Austrians, the remnant of the army of unemployed, numbering one thousand, which left Winnipeg last Friday bound for the United States, have found a temporary haven here, where they are being fed and housed comfortably, and as a result have signified their intention of making no immediate effort to cross the border. So far they are orderly. They were notified yesterday by United States immigration officials that they would not be permitted to cross the international line.

Mayor Gasselman, of Emerson, has removed requests that Canadian military authorities take charge of the men, who are subject to internment.

A STEAMER SUNK.

Loss of Life Feared in Collision Off Quebec.

Quebec, May 19.—The steamer Christine, 14 men aboard, was sunk in collision with another craft off Island of Orleans last night. It is feared that several lives were lost.

The Christine, which was a 100-ton steamer, was formerly Lord Strathcona's private yacht.

It is reported that the Christine's crew of fourteen men, eight perished and six were saved. Captain Kennedy, master of the steamer, was saved but is seriously injured.

Establishment of a clearing hospital at Quebec, possibly at Valcartier, for the classification of wounded members of the Canadian Expeditionary Force who may be sent home as incapacitated is being projected, so far.
