REVOLUTION LONG IN AIR.

Plans Laid as Far Back as Last

Paris, May 19.—A despatch to the Havas Agency from Lisbon says the project for the revolution in Portugal was formed three days after the constitution last March of the Cabinet of General Pimenta Castro. Dr. Alvaro Castro, the correspondent says, took charge of the military arrangements Antonio Maria Silva undertook to organize the civilians, and Captain Leotte Rego, of the Navy, agreed to command the naval forces.

The Lisbon newspapers state, says the Havas correspondent in the Por-tuguese capital, that General Pim-enta Castro, the President of the Cabinet, declared that when the revolutionary movement broke out he offered the collective resignation of the ministry to President De Arriaga. It is added that General Castro assured the new cabinet of his loyalty. Two hundred persons killed and five hundred wounded are the reported results of the fighting. Most of the killed and wounded belonged to
