

SOUS LE CAP WOLFE MONUMENT

T is not necessary to cross the Atlantic to see something of Old France, for in the beautiful city of Quebec many characteristics and echoes of the old French regime may still be seen. Sous le Cap Street is like a corner out of some Norman city with its narrow passages and steep-roofed houses. The Chateau Frontenac is built on the site of the old Chateau St. Louis and repeats the architecture of mediaeval France, so far as is consistent with the necessities of a modern hostelry. St. Anne is the patron saint of sailors, and St. Anne de Beaupré is the greatest pilgrim church in Canada. Several hundred thousand visit the shrine each year, and as many cures are reported as at Lourdes. Near St. Anne de Beaupré are the Montmorency Falls, which are higher than the falls at Niagara.
