Swetman, who was formerly secretary of the Frid-Lewis Construction Company at Regina has been appointed an assistant to F. W. Little in the Militia Y. M. C. A. at Barrieffield Camp.

## BERLIN OF OPINION

That Italy Is Bent Upon a Sudden U-turn.

Berlin, May 21.—No definite information is available here regarding the Italian situation. An outbreak of hostilities is regarded as absolutely certain, but whether the Italian Government intends to take a decisive step and declare war to-day, or will postpone the delivery of her ultimatum for a few days is unknown, even at the foreign office, although there is still uninterrupted telegraphic communication between Berlin and Prince von Buelow, the German Ambassador in Rome. The call of the Austro-German Ambassador on Baron Sonnino, the Italian Foreign Minister, yesterday, had to do with arrangements for protection of German and Austrian nationals, who may be in Italy at the time war is declared. It is believed here that events will develop with lightning-like rapidity once hostilities begin. It is thought the Italians probably will lay great value to a sudden stroke to gain an initial victory. There is reason to believe that the Austro-Germans are not behind the Italians on the preparations.

## Marconi Goes to Supervise Italy's Wireless



WILLIAM MARCONI (Special to the Whig.) New York, May 21.—Saying "My country wants me, I must go," William Marconi, wireless inventor, abruptly left the United States District Court to-day to sail for Italy. At noon to-day he received messages from the Ambassador and the King to return to his fatherland to take charge of the entire wireless system there. He will sail to-morrow morning.

## The Russians May Envelop the Germans

London, May 21.—The Russian reports continue to minimize the importance of the German and Austrian advance in Galicia, which the Vienna official dispatch indicates is converging on Przemyel from all sides. Fighting is general along the whole front, but the fight for Przemyel is at the moment the big event, the enemy's guns continuing to bombard that stronghold. Fighting is continuous around Czernowitz, the capital of Bukowina.

In the Shavli region a Russian official account, which is only up to the 15th, reports the capture of hundreds of prisoners and some machine guns. Frederick Rennet, the Petrograd correspondent of the London Daily News, cables: It is calculated that the Germans have lost 150,000 men since their advance began from the Danube. General Radke Dmistriff's army during its successful retreat northeast from Gorlice to the San accounted for 70,000.

The entire Russian Army in Galicia is now in a position to manoeuvre as it pleases. The extreme right from Opatow has moved westward into South Poland, and now threatens to envelop the Germans.

### SAYS GREATEST PERIL.

To the British Empire Is Lord Northcliffe. (Special to the Whig.) London, May 21.—Discussing to-day the criticism of Lord Kitchener in Lord Northcliffe's publications, the Daily News says Lord Northcliffe is to-day the greatest peril which threatens the British Empire and more sinister than even the enemy in the field.

### Saw Canadian Crucified.

Stratford, May 21.—Lieut. J. B. Morrison, of Winnipeg, a brother of Mrs. (Capt.) T. G. Delamere, Stratford, writing home declares that he actually saw a Canadian soldier who had been crucified by Germans, after being captured in one of the recent great battles in which our gallant boys won undying glory.

### Dutch Army of 1,000,000.

London, May 21.—The Amsterdam correspondent of the Post says the Dutch war minister announced in parliament that a bill is being prepared providing for universal compulsory military training. This measure would increase the army to approximately 1,000,000 men.
