PTE. JOYCE WOUNDED

BUT DID NOT HAVE TO GO TO HOSPITAL.

Gunner Karl Green, Kingston, Also Among Wounded—A Gananoque Artilleryman's Close Call.

A letter has been received from Pte. Michael Joyce with the 14th Regiment detachment of the 2nd Overseas Battalion in which he states that in the battle of Langemarck he was slightly wounded. He is not in hospital but resting in the billets, and is expected to be able to go back on the firing line in the near future.

Gr. Karl Green Wounded

Gunner Karl Green, Kingston, was wounded according to a letter received from Lieut. Taylor of the 5th Kingston Battery. Lieut. Taylor said in his letter: "I had seven of my men wounded, two on my gun and five on the 2nd Battery. Karl Green got a shrapnel wound in the back. I think the wounded will be all right in a month or two."

Progressing Favorably

Pte. W. Murray and Pte. R. Neilson, 2nd Battalion, who were wounded in the battle of Langemarck are progressing favorably. They are in the Le Treport, (France) Canadian General Hospital.

Had Close Shave

Josh Zivian with the Gananoque Battery was hit by a shrapnel bullet and had a close call. In writing home he said: "The doctor says I must have had my heart in my mouth for it is a mystery how the bullet missed my heart. The bullet entered immediately below the heart, pierced the chest, shot straight upwards and came out of the shoulder, damaging two ribs in the course of its journey. The young batteryman is in the hospital and will recover."

ESCAPED WITHOUT SCRATCH.

Private H. J. McGill Lost All Belongings But His Rifle.

In a letter dated May 2nd, from Belgium, Pte. H. J. McGill states in part: "Just a few lines to let you know that I am in the best of health. I suppose you have been worried since you read about us being in the thick of the battle of a week ago around Ypres. I came out of it without a scratch, and would have written you sooner only that I lost everything I had with the exception of my rifle and ammunition, but we expect to go back to the base in a few days to reorganise, and then we will be all fit and up again, so do not think of sending anything to me for a while. The mail bags, which were in a building behind the trenches, were burned by a shell, but I am told that all parcels have been sent to the base."

In another letter dated May 8th Private H. J. McGill stated that he and his companions were now in their billets resting and enjoying themselves. The writer states that they sadly miss the Kingston boys who fell in action, and the others who are missing. "We are now in the army reserves," he adds, "and will likely remain until we have received our new drafts to bring us up to full strength. There is a Connolly, from Kingston, in our platoon, and he is fine, but out at present, but will have him write to his people. Don't worry about our wants, as we have everything possible."

Both the letters were endorsed by Capt. Richardson, the latter's name appearing on the envelopes.

SHOT IN THE NECK

While in a Bush—Harold McCartney's Narrow Escape.

Harold McCartney, about eighteen years of age, residing on University Avenue, ran a close shave from meeting death as a result of being shot in the neck from a 22-calibre long rifle bullet on Sunday afternoon. With other boys he was out in one of the nearby bushes. One of his companions was realizing the danger to which he exposed other members of the party twirled his rifle aloft in the air over his head. Accidentally it discharged and the bullet entered Mr. McCartney's neck. Up examination at the Hotel Dieu, to which he was rushed immediately afterwards, it was found the lead came within an eighth of an inch of puncturing the jugular vein. The bullet was extracted and it is not thought anything serious will result.

CASUALTIES NUMBER 300.

The Canadian Losses at Festubert Last Thursday.

(Special to the Whig.) Ottawa, May 25.—The figures of "missing" in the last action in which the Canadians participated at Festubert last Thursday, have increased to 102, in addition to 66 killed and 132 wounded. It is believed the British suffered the heaviest. The total Canadian casualties in this action are now three hundred. The lists will be published as soon as received.

Art Treasures in Upper Italy Moved to Florence For Safety

Florence, Italy, May 25.—A report is current here that the Italian court is to be moved from Rome and installed in the Pitti Palace in Florence. From here the King will make frequent trips to the front, and the Queen will direct the operations of the Italian Red Cross Society, of which she is president. Three royal villas in the neighborhood of Florence are to be used as hospitals.

All the most valuable works of art from the cities of Northern Italy have been brought down to Florence in anticipation of possible bombardments by the Austrians. The contents of San Salvi shelters art treasures brought from Venice, Udine, Treviso, etc. Precious manuscripts have been taken away.

TROOPS ARE ARRIVING

The 38th Battalion, Ottawa, will arrive on Wednesday afternoon, and will go immediately into camp.
