THE CAMP AT BARRIEFIELD COSTS \$200,000 A MONTH

Drill of the Overseas Troops Proceeding Splendidly.

TON OF BREAD BAKED BY THE ARMY SERVICE CORPS ON MONDAY.

The Men Will Receive Summer Clothing for Drill in Hot Sun—Major H. J. Dawson Mentioned For Command of New Battalion.

Col. T. D. R. Hemming, Commandant, passed the remark on Tuesday about Barriefield Camp being everything that it should be and that the men were working hard. This is certainly the case and it can be seen on the faces of the men.

The tent of the Whig correspondent is becoming the centre of gossip for the men. The lawn in front is very inviting and members stretch out and talk or think of "what the day has brought."

The drill is proceeding splendidly and the large area has given a splendid opportunity for more advanced field-work.

Capt. Ferguson, 8th C. M. R., has not yet returned from leave but is expected to return when the Regiment will be paid to date.

The 7th Artillery Brigade was paid to date on Monday, as was also part of the recruiting base.

The 8th C. M. R. practised bayonet fighting on the field across the road from their camp on Monday.

All the "streets" between the rows of tents of the infantry lines are being given names. This is done by the men themselves.

The stones which line the different roads around camp are being white-washed.

A horse of the 8th C.M.R. dropped dead under its rider on Monday afternoon. The animal was a beautiful black, and one of the best in the regiment.

A man walked the thirty miles from Gananoque to enlist in the 8th C. M. R. on Sunday. He was so equipped and given a much-appreciated supper.

For the first time since in camp what is known as the "dismounted drill" was practised on Monday by the 8th C. M. R. This consists of leading the horse, the while driving and firing at a supposed enemy in the bush.

It costs about \$200,000 a month for regular expenses to maintain Barriefield Camp. There are now about 3,800 men exclusive of the Staff and Supply Units.

Pte. J. L. Berton, 38th Battalion, has been promoted to Acting Pay Sergeant of the Battalion.

Major G. E. Starr, Canon Grout, and Revs. V. O. Boyle and Cecil Win-ters were visitors to the camp on Monday afternoon.

A neat little grass-covered pile of stones has been built in front of the "Big Ben" of the 38th Battalion and on the grass on the white-washed stones are the words "38th Battalion, C.E.R."

One section of the 38th Battalion each morning and afternoon parade to the ranges for musketry instruction. The troops for this work are using the Mark III Ross rifle, which is the kind they will use at the front.

Another company of the 38th Battalion of which the officers are Capt. A. Ross, and Lieuts. F. Smylie, (Kingston) R. Betshell, A. G. Parlane, and A. Fraser, will leave immediately.

Lieut.-Col. Fee in command of the base, is working under difficulties. His unit is a constant varying strength as when men are wanted for any other unit it is from the base that they are taken. It is expected that in the near future the order will be issued to bring the Lindsay (360 men) Smith's Falls (seventy-five men) and other surplus troops totaling 1,000 to the camp. This will bring the base up to over the strength of a battalion.

Lieut. Brandon, formerly attached to the 21st Battalion, is acting quarter master of the base.

The strength of the base at present is 453 men exclusive of officers. There are sufficient officers in the 38th Battalion to supply the company which will be drafted to that unit.

Fatigue uniform of khaki-duck and straw hats will be issued immediately. On Tuesday the men had to drill wearing their heavy cloth trousers and although their coats were removed the weather was too warm to make drilling comfortable.

Lieut. Charles is acting transport officer of the camp under Major J. Hamilton. The transport officer is very busy as he is responsible for the handling of all supplies between the different units.

The erecting of a moving picture theatre at the Y.M.C.A., tent is being rushed and is expected to be finished in a few days.

The details of the drafts for overseas as mentioned in Monday's Whig are as follows: The 8th Regiment, C.M.R., is sending two sergeants, two corporals, one trumpeter and forty-five privates under the command of Lieut. H. K. Clemens, is of "C" Squadron, 8th C.M.R., and who is seconded from the 2nd Dragoons of St. Catharines.

The R.C.H.A., have a surplus of fifty men and these will go over under two officers yet to be chosen.

The 25th and 26th Batteries of the 7th Artillery Brigade are sending over fifty men under one captain and one subaltern.

These men will go directly to the front as reinforcements for units that have sufficient casualties. The men from the 8th C.M.R., are going into the Royal Canadian Dragoons.

The opinion is held by officers that the R.C.H.A., is being used partly as a precaution against an attack on English shores and partly as a recruiting depot for other artillery brigades at the front. Gr. George Place, who it was announced a few days ago to receive a V. C. enlisted in the Ammunition column in England and was later transferred to a brigade at the front.

The 7th Artillery Brigade will receive in all about 100 horses from buyers throughout the county.

The 38th Battalion orderly room tent is one of the best in camp, having a telephone and other equipment. C. S. M. Price, formerly in charge of recruiting for the 43rd Regiment Armouries in Ottawa, is in charge.

Capt. S. H. Simpson, Kingston has been appointed dentist surgeon for the camp. He is an officer of the 14th Battalion.

The Army Service Corps turned out its first batch of bread on Monday—2,000 pounds of the finest kind of bread that could be desired. One section of the overseas is being equipped, and another section is being built. Sergt. Baker Pollett is in charge of this work.

Capt. Parkinson, ("A" Company) 38th Battalion, is formerly of the Ottawa Journal.

The laundry of the camp is being sent to the Ontario Laundry in Toronto. Some Kingston firms could do this work, as no contract has been awarded.

A barber shop in connection with the Y.M.C.A., has been opened and is well patronized by the soldiers.

A course of instruction for N.C.O.'s was started on Tuesday in connection with the base unit, Sergt. Major Noble is the instructor of the twenty-five N.C.O.'s, taking the course.

An officer's mess and a sergeant's mess have been organized in connection with the base unit.

Rifles and belts were issued on Tuesday to the surplus overseas volunteers who go to form the base unit of the camp. The men, although nearly all are recruits, are receiving a splendid training and doing exceptionally well.

It is stated that the 28th Battalion is superior in drill to any battalion which was on Salisbury Plain, with the exception of the Princess Patricia's, which of course was composed of veterans.

There is much talk about the delay in announcing the names of the officers who are to be in charge of the new overseas battalions to be raised in the third division. Everyone in Kingston hopes that merit will be recognized and that the command will be given to Major H. J. Dawson. Major Dawson is well known as a student of military tactics and strategy, as an expert in rifle shooting, and as a good disciplinarian. He is a man who has never pushed himself forward, but has relied for his advancement on his military merits. It is an open secret that several of the best officers in the city would gladly go under his command, who are at present doubtful, and that his appointment would greatly stimulate recruiting alike in the city and in the adjoining counties.
