Another Pile-Up ON THE G.T.R. LINE

Seventeen Cars Were Wrecked And One Man Was Severely Injured.

Shortly after five o'clock Thursday evening, near Rideau station, a couple of miles east of Kingston, a serious accident occurred on the G. T. R. when the west-bound freight came to grief, having fifteen cars derailed. The scene of this accident was not far from where the two men were killed on Thursday afternoon. The cause of the accident is unknown, but it is believed that the rails spread, with the result that seventeen cars were derailed.

A Whig reporter, speaking to an eye witness of the pile-up, was told that several of the flanges on the wheels were smashed by the force of the derailment. The cars in some cases were broken into kindling wood and scattered on both sides of the track. For a considerable distance the track was piled deep with debris, and several trains had to be held up until the tracks were cleared. In some cases trains were almost three hours late.

According to information received by a Whig reporter on Friday morning from Charles Lawson, the injured man taken from the debris of the wreck, besides himself there were two other men, Robert Costello and George Stephenson. No word has been received of these men. It is not known where they have gone to.

FRONTENAC CHEESE BOARD

Prices Took a Drop at Thursday's Meeting.

The price of cheese took a slight drop at the meeting of the Frontenac Cheese Board Thursday afternoon, when it sold for 17 9-16c. Messrs. Smith and Murphy purchased the bulk of the offering at this price. There was boarded 594 boxes of colored cheese, and 277 boxes of white.


