PROBE ARMY PURCHASES.

Sir Charles Davidson Appointed Royal Commissioner.

Ottawa, June 4.—At a cabinet council Sir Charles Davidson, former chief justice of the Superior Court of Quebec, was appointed a Royal Commissioner to further enquire into army purchases in Canada, supplementary to the enquiries made by the committee on public accounts. The chief justice will determine the procedure. The different contracts will be examined, and anything of a suspicious character will be probed. The enquiry will likely be partly public and partly private. Counsel and experts to assist the commissioner will likely be selected.

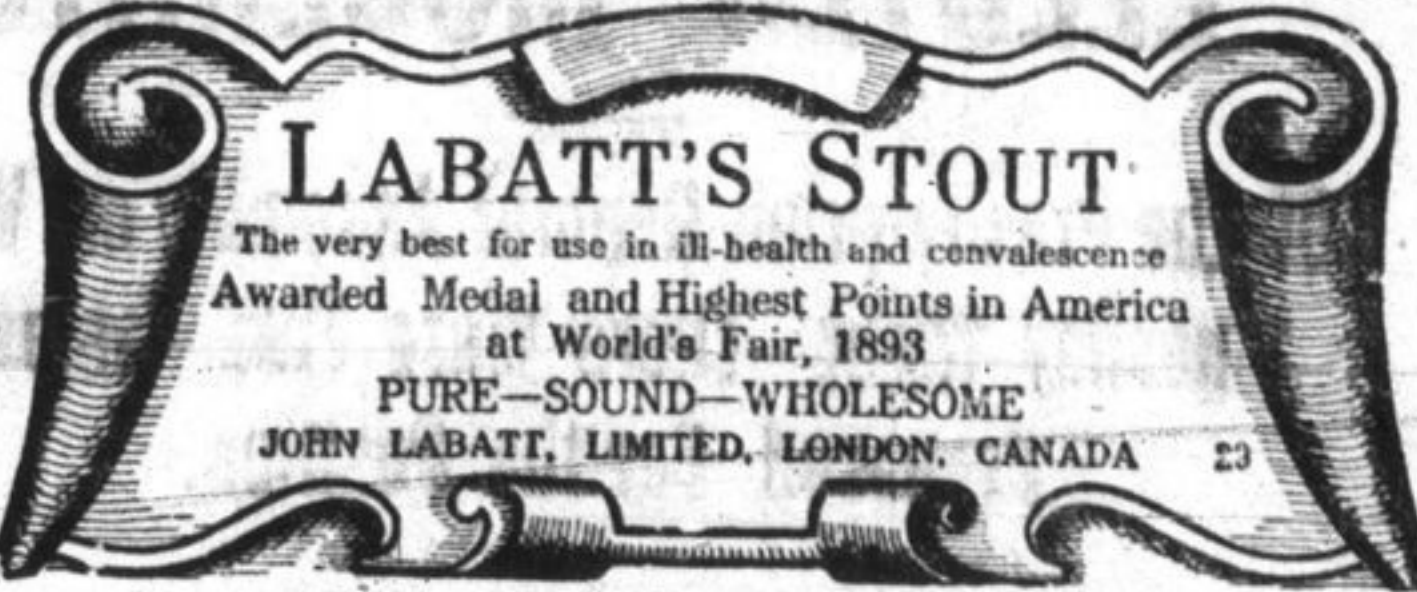
U.S. Steel Head Optimistic.

New York, June 4.—President Farrell, of the American Steel Corporation, said: "I am very optimistic concerning outlook for steel and iron and look for a long stretch of prosperous times."

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CANADA'S BONDS

Many Issues Have Been Absorbed at Home.

Toronto, June 4.—Canadian municipalities negotiated loans in the home market during the first four months of the present year aggregating \$13,249,028, or \$2,670,574 less than was borrowed during the same period last year.

Canadian municipalities negotiated loans in the United States market during the first four months of the present year aggregating \$16,214,772, or \$16,121,772 more than was borrowed in the same period last year.

Textile Profits Higher.

Montreal, June 4.—The annual meeting of the shareholders of the Dominion Textile Company was held at the head offices here this afternoon. The financial statement presented showed the profits for the year 1914-15 were \$1,230,767, as compared with \$1,196,990 in 1913-14. The balance carried forward amounted to \$881,925, as compared with \$829,379 last year. At a subsequent meeting of the directors the officers were re-elected, with C. B. Gordon as president.

United Shoe Earnings Lower.

Boston, June 4.—The report of the United Shoe Machinery Co., for the year ended Feb. 28th, 1915, shows earnings of \$4,861,091, which compares with \$6,177,114 in the previous year and \$6,160,167 for the year ended Feb. 28th, 1914. After paying the dividends on preferred stock, the balance for the common was \$2.75 per share, compared with \$4.80 per share in each of the two previous years.

Record Sugar Sales.

New York, June 4.—Announcement was made of the purchase of 22,400,000 pounds of granulated sugar by the French Government. Three-fifths of this quantity was sold by the American Sugar Refining Company, and shipment will be made from New Orleans. The remaining two-fifths will be shipped from New York and Philadelphia.

April Exports Beat Record.

New York, June 4.—Excess of exports from this country in April proved much larger than preliminary estimates, amounting to \$132,839,093 and breaking all previous records for that month.

Assembling Plant at Calgary.

Calgary, Alta., June 4.—It is probable that the Ford Motor Company will shortly start the construction of an assembling plant here, according to F. Gordon McGregor, general manager of the Canadian company, who has just left here for the coast.

The Highest On Record.

Pittsburgh, June 4.—The advance in the shares of Crucible Steel Company of America to the highest price on record, has resulted in rumors that the company has decided to issue bonds and to pay off the back dividends upon the preferred shares which aggregate over 20 per cent. Well informed interests here do not believe the report and they attribute the advance in the stock solely to "war" orders that have been received indirectly by the company. The Crucible Steel Company of America owns a valuable plant in Germany.
