ASKS FOR A RENEWAL OF ITS POWER CONTRACT

Under the Old Rate of 1.20 Cents a Kilo-Watt.

COMPANY IS UNABLE TO PAY ANY MORE THAN THIS FIGURE.

H. W. Richardson invited the Utilities Commission to inspect the Company's Books and See What the Earnings Are. The Street Railway Company has opened negotiations with the Utilities Commission for a renewal of the contract for the supply of electricity for the operations of its cars.

After some discussion Mr. Richardson asked the Commission to have the company's books inspected so it could see that the statements concerning the earnings were correct. The Commission decided to do so, and on the matter being brought up by Mr. Birkett, it was also decided to have a test made on a rotary converter to see at what cost power could be produced for the street railway.

While the matter was under discussion, Mr. Birkett said that the last Government report showed that there had been a steady increase in the passenger traffic of the Kingston Street Railway.

Mr. Nickle pointed out, however, that this report was only up till the end of June, 1914. This did not include during war time. Since the war the road was not on a paying basis.

Mr. Richardson made it quite plain to the members that the railway was not a paying proposition, and that he was tired of going down into his pocket to finance it.

Mr. Richardson also stated that the company had put the double track on Princess street at an expenditure of about \$14,000. The company had not been forced to do this, but having the best interests of the city at heart, had gone on with the expenditure.

Mr. Nickle declared that it required but one boiler to give the power, and that the company was charged interest on two boilers. Mr. Nickle asked Manager Folger what was the lowest commercial rate the Commission could give.

Mr. Folger stated that the lowest commercial rate was 1.75 cents. "Just see how if we are not paying more than the commercial rate," explained Mr. Nickle.

Mr. Richardson remarked that a street railway should be regarded as a good investment for the city. It should be looked upon in the same light as an industry. The railway, he contended, was just as good for the city as two or three industries located here.

"We would be a pretty back number here if we did not have the cars," he added. Chairman Rigney said he agreed with Mr. Richardson on this point, but it was a matter that rested with the people.

It was finally decided that the Commission should appoint a man to look over the books of the company for the purpose of securing a statement of earnings, and also to see what it will cost the Commission to produce the necessary power.

The old contract between the city and the Street Railway Company expired on November 1st last, and it appears that the company did not make a written application for a renewal of the contract within the specified time, although the company claim that a verbal application was made. Now, the matter has been brought to a head as a result of the deputation from the company waiting upon the Commission, and as a result of the meeting Monday afternoon, the first step towards securing a new contract has been taken.

The chairman, T. J. Rigney, presided at the meeting, and the other members present were R. H. Toye, G. Y. Chown, and J. H. Birkett.

Kingston Prisoner Says He is Well Treated.

A prisoner in Glessen is the message just received from Pte. Bryce Davidson, of the 2nd Battalion, by his sister, Mrs. J. J. Madill, of 12 McMurich street, Toronto.

"There are about three bullet holes in my coat, and that is close enough for me," he writes. "I was captured on the 24th, when our battalion was completely cut up. We are getting used very well here. There are lots of the Queen's Own with us. I had the butt of my rifle shot out of my hands, and I lost all my kit. Send me some plain cakes and some tea and a pipe. I am the only one left out of my section, and I don't quite yet know how I came to be alive."

NEW ELECTRIC RATES

TO GO INTO EFFECT ON 1ST OF JULY.

They Will Be On the Floor Space Basis—The Schedule of Rates Is Given.

By a unanimous vote, the Civic Utilities Commission, at a meeting on Monday afternoon, decided to put into effect on July 1st, the new rates for the charges in electricity on the floor space basis, recommended some time ago by the Hydro-Electric Power Commission, and the manager of the light plant was instructed to make the necessary changes for the fixed charges.

Under these new charges, the much-talked about meter charges are done away with, and the consumers both for domestic and commercial lighting will realize a big cut in their rates. The charges for domestic lighting at present at 10 cents per kilowatt and 50 cents every quarter for meter rent. Under the new rate the charges will be 20 cents for every thousand square feet of floor space. The schedule follows:

Domestic Lighting—2 cents per 100 square feet of floor space area per month. Plus 5 cents per kilowatt for current used up to 3 kilowatt per 100 feet floor area, plus 10 K.W.H. with a minimum of 40 K. W. H., all excess at 2 cents discount. Commercial Lighting—10 cents for the first 30 hours' use of connected hour, all excess 2 cents per K.W.H. Power—Service charges, \$1 per horse power per month demand, plus 5 cents per K. W. H. for first fifty hours' use of connected load or maximum demand, plus 3 cents per K. W. H. for the next fifty hours, plus 1 cent per K. W. H. for all excess.
