and in other by motor transport. While each man has a definite amount of rations allowed him by the department, it does not work out in quite such strict lines. Each day the quartermasters of the units send in to the Army Service Corps the requisition for the rations required for just the amount coming to the unit according to the scales. No more or no less. If there are 100 men in the unit, he will receive 125 pounds of bread, 100 pounds of some kinds of meat and so on. There is a blank form containing all the articles of food that make up the soldier's rations and the quartermaster fills in

These go to the office of the Army Service Corps, are carefully checked to see that they are correct, then orders are issued from this office to the master-butcher, master baker, and the head of the grocery department to issue the rations to which the unit is entitled. The bread and groceries are delivered that afternoon for the use the following day and the meat is delivered at 6 a.m. the next day. Care is taken not to deliver meat and the bread or gro-

ceries in the same load, for fear of one causing the other to deteriorate. Thus while each unit gets only exactly what is due it, the amount of food is not so carefully weighed out by the cook.
