A BY-LAW TO REPEAL BY-LAW NO. 66, 1913, BEING TO PROVIDE FOR ENTRUSTING THE CONTROL AND MANAGEMENT OF THE PUBLIC UTILITIES OF THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF KINGSTON TO A COMMISSION.

WHEREAS by the above-mentioned By-law the control and management of the Public Utilities of the Corporation of the City of Kingston were entrusted to a Commission.

1. By-Law No. 66, 1913, is hereby repealed. 2. This By-law shall come into force and take effect on its passing.

NOTICE Notice is hereby given, that the foregoing is a true copy of a proposed By-law of the Corporation of the City of Kingston, which has been taken into consideration, and which will be finally passed by the Council of said Corporation in the event of the assent of the electors being obtained thereon, after

one month from the first publication thereof in the Daily British Whig newspaper, the date of which first publication will be the 26th day of May, 1915.

The votes of the electors of the Corporation of the City of Kingston, shall be taken on the said proposed By-law on the 21st day of June, A.D. 1915, between the hours of nine o'clock in the forenoon and five o'clock in the afternoon, at the following places and by the following deputy returning officers, namely:—

William Saunders, Deputy Returning Officer. Rideau Ward—Polling Sub-division Nos. 18 and 19 at 247 Brock street. Herbert Holder, Deputy Returning Officer. Rideau Ward—Polling Sub-division Nos. 17 and 21 at 621 Itracene street. John Peters, Deputy Returning Officer. Victoria Ward—Polling Sub-division Nos. 22 and 23 at 222 Earl street. Patrick Lawless, Deputy Returning Officer. Victoria Ward—Polling Sub-division Nos. 24 and 25 at 27 King street. Ford Webster, Deputy Returning Officer. On the 16th day of June, 1915, at the hour of eleven o'clock in the Mayor's office, the head of the Council of the said Corporation or some member of the Council appointed for that purpose by resolution shall attend at said place in the said Municipality for the purpose of appointing, and if required to do so, shall appoint by writing signed by him two persons to attend at the final summing up of the votes by the Clerk and one person to attend at each polling place on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of opposing the proposed By-law, and a like number on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of opposing the proposed By-law. On the 22nd day of June, 1915, at the hour of twelve o'clock noon at the City Clerk's office, in the said Municipality, the Clerk of the said Municipality, shall attend and sum up the votes given for and against the proposed By-law.
