TWO MEN SENTENCED

TO TERM ON PRISON FARM FOR STEALING CATTLE

James Morahan Was Given Nine Months and William McIlroy Six Months.

James Morahan, not less than nine months and not more than fifteen months, at hard labor, on the prison farm at Guelph.

William McIlroy, not less than six months and not more than twelve months on the prison farm at Guelph.

These sentences were imposed by Judge Madden, in the County Court at noon on Friday, a jury on Wednesday having found the two men guilty of stealing cattle in the township of Storrington. Judge Madden remanded them in order to give them time to consider the matter of making restitution.

Morahan who is 42 years old, was sentenced first, and in addressing him Judge Madden said:

"Your counsel says you have arranged to make restitution for the value of the cattle stolen and that you have also made arrangements to meet the costs of the Crown in conducting the prosecution. Having done so, I think you have shown the first signs of reformation. I cannot let you go free. The laws of the land have to be carried out and you have to suffer for the offence against society. Society has to be protected against such things. In imposing sentence upon William McIlroy, who is but nineteen years of age, Judge Madden said:

"I think that perhaps you were led into this by the other man who is much older and should have known better. You are a young man and have a chance to make good."

Morahan and McIlroy were found guilty of stealing a two-year old heifer, the property of Irwin Card. The two were tried last December but on that occasion the jury disagreed on the case.

J. Rigney acted as counsel for the two men. J. L. Whiting conducted the prosecution.

Other Cases Heard.

The case of Jan Laskowsky vs. Peter Meltz and Julia Meltz, was an action for the return of \$517.76, balance claimed to be due for money loaned with interest. A. B. Cunningham appeared for the plaintiff and Messrs. Nickle and Farrell for the defendants. Laskowsky, according to his story, stated that he had been hurt in an accident at Perth, and had been laid up in the General Hospital. He received \$600 as a result of the injuries he received. After coming out of the hospital he became acquainted with Peter and Julia Meltz. He said later on he kept company with Meltz's daughter, and that it was his intention to marry her. He swore that he gave Mrs. Meltz \$500, but Mrs. Meltz denied receiving any money.

This case was dismissed, but Peter Meltz laid a counter charge, for slander, but this case was dismissed upon an apology being given by the accused.

Karl Goldman acted as interpreter in the case.

The case of Nicholas Amey vs. Margaret Johnston, action of \$500 damages for slander, was dismissed without costs.

When the court adjourned for lunch at noon on Friday, the case of Annie Duffy vs. D. L. Babcock, an action for \$300, claimed to be due for wages was being heard. The plaintiff is suing for this amount as housekeeper for defendant at his home in Sharbot Lake and in Kingston.

T. J. Rigney is counsel for the plaintiff, G. M. Macdonnell is acting for the defendant.

DR. DYDE WILL REMAIN AS PRINCIPAL OF ROBERTSON COLLEGE, EDMONTON.

Refuses Offer From Saskatchewan University—His Son Is a Lieutenant With the Royal Field Artillery In France.

Rev. Dr. S. W. Dyde left on Friday afternoon for Edmonton after attending the meeting of the Presbyterian Assembly. He will remain the principal of the Robertson College at that place, the Assembly having become responsible for the finances of the College during this period of stress. Dr. Dyde had a tempting offer to become professor of philosophy and English in the University of Saskatchewan, but his heart was in the work of Robertson College, which he inaugurated, and he will hold the post at Edmonton for the Presbyterians.

Principal Dyde, before leaving, received a letter from his son, W. Farrell Dyde, who is a second lieutenant in the 51st Battery, 9th Division, Royal Field Artillery, Lieut. Dyde's battery reached France about a month ago, and on the 14th of May was within range of the guns. This young Kingstonian first took a full course in England as a trooper, and then was transferred to the Royal Artillery and given a commission.
