**ITALIANS THE GAYEST
SOLDIERS IN THE WAR**

**Fraternal Relations Between
Officers and Men.**

**A FRIENDLY RIVALRY
EXISTS AMONG THE VARIOUS
ARMY CORPS.**

Many Aristocrats Are Dashing Cavalry Leaders.—The Italian Gunners Show Coolness and Initiative.

Chiasso, June 10.—This despatch telegraphed from the frontier comes in reality from as near the front as the military authorities will permit correspondents to go. I am not allowed to mention the spot, whence I wrote, but they say that a fortnight ago it was Austrian territory.

It is now resounding with war songs of the gayest soldiers fighting in the European conflagration. The songs echo from mount to mount, and mingle with the vivas of the inhabitants, transformed into the most precious scouts any army can desire. In fact under their guidance these soldiers with their vigor and ardor would seem superhuman are trans- forming the mountains under my very eyes. What this morning was a narrow contorted mulepath has been changed, as by enchantment into a wide road for guncarriages.

Regiments of engineers are making the whole mountain resound as though they were an arms factory. They have mined rock, cut stone, erected trenches, made platforms for guns, destroyed forests which obstructed the range for the guns, so that to-night heaps neglected by the enemy as inexecutable have been returned into redoubtable fortifications, where the 75 calibre guns, which have proved already more and more than the inventors hoped, are all ready to shell the enemy's posi-

**A BUMPER YIELD
OF FIELD CROPS**

**A Billion Bushels of Wheat
Alone Expected
IN THE UNITED STATES**

THE FARMERS INDEED IN A HAPPY MOOD.

Wet and Cold Weather Saves Plants From Insect Blight.—Spring Unusually Favorable for Soil Tilling.

Washington, June 11.—Prospects of a billion-bushel wheat crop were brightened during the last week by favorable weather for both winter and spring wheat, according to the national weather and crop bulletin. Since the government's June 1st canvass, upon which the Crop Reporting Board predicted a 950,000,000-bushel wheat crop, which with good growing weather might reach a billion bushels, winter wheat is said to have generally improved, while spring wheat made satisfactory progress.

"Despite further rains in some of the important winter wheat states," says the crop bulletin, "the wheat crop appears not to have suffered to any extent, save from flooding and too rank growth in limited areas.

"Over the remaining districts wheat generally improved during the week, and the continued wet and cold weather appears to have still fur-

LOOKED UPON AS SPY

A SOLDIER BEING HELD IN BARRIFIELD CAMP.

When Intoxicated He Told What Germany Would Do to the Allies—His Case Being Enquired Into.

There is a man in one of the units in Barrifield camp who is suspected of being a German spy, and his downfall came through imbibing too freely. Some time ago this man crossed from the United States to Brockville, but was immediately deported as an undesirable. A few weeks later he was successful in evading the immigration officers, and he promptly enlisted for overseas service with the infantry.

No suspicion was attached to the man up to a few days ago, when he came to the city, and had to be carried back to the camp. In the guard room he kept telling his companions what Germany could, and was going to do, and that there was no hope for the Allies. Then some one "smashed him" so thoroughly that the foreigner did not wake up until next morning.

When brought up before his commanding officer, he denied all knowledge of having expressed pro-German views, but nevertheless he was kept as a prisoner. It is understood that the case has been submitted to both the American and Canadian governments, who are considering what action will be taken, but in the meantime he is looked upon as being the first spy in Barrifield camp.

WAR BULLETINS.

Serbian despatches say that Austrian aviators bombarded Keagevats arsenal Thursday morning killing some civilians but no material damage was done.

Geneva advices say the Russians are apparently succeeding in cutting off a large part of the Bavarian Army advancing on Lemberg.

French troops Thursday afternoon stormed and captured three more lines of trenches near St. Mihiel. The Germans are counter-attacking fiercely.

The Rome War Department reports that the Italian Army in Austria is still driving the Austrians back.

French losses since the beginning of the war total 1,300,000. Four million five thousand men have already been called to the colors.

The Germans are now using flaming bullets against the British. These are filled with sulphur and ignite on discharge of the rifle.

Six thousand wounded Canadians are under treatment in Britain at present.

Premier Asquith will ask for a new war credit of one billion five hundred million dollars.
