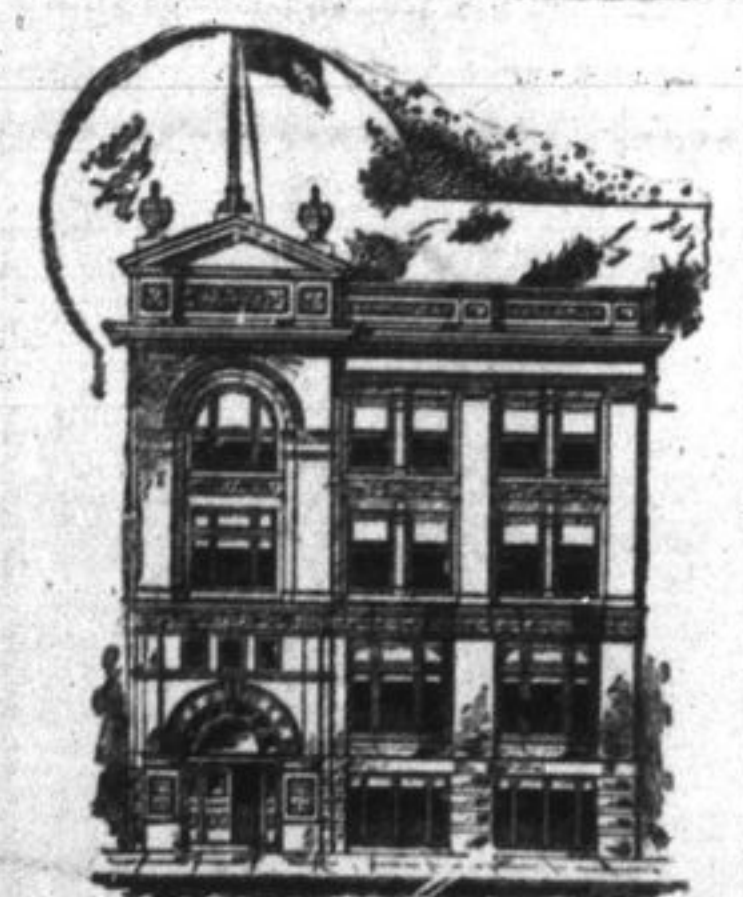

CANADA SURELY FAVORED.

A visitor to the Whig Office has authority for the statement that the summer resorts will be largely patronized this year. NO DECISION REACHED

IN THE SPORADIC CONFLICT IN GALICIA

Germans Again Use Gas—Russian Advance Continues On Lower Reaches of the Dubysa—Compelled To Withdraw From Shavil.

Petrograd, June 10.—The Germans have again reinforced their three army corps which raided the Baltic Province. Under the weight of the superior forces brought against them, the Russians have again been compelled to withdraw and concentrate their strength little west of Shavil.

In the north of Rawa the Germans once more took advantage of a favoring wind to attempt to poison the Russian lines with gas.

This expert says the Zydrezaw attack failed because the left bank of the Dniester here has sands high in the opposite bank, while at Zarawno the Germans succeeded in getting across for the reason that contrary conditions are present—namely, the enemy bank there is higher and commands the country opposite.
