This war will not last forever. The time to investigate war expenditures will come. Such an investigation will show that France and Russia could not do business with Canadian manufacturers via New York, except under a system twenty-five per cent. commissions. That hellish system gives the middleman who does nothing a plunder of \$250,000 out of every \$1,000,000 spent in war supplies. A wise and strong Government at Ottawa could easily turn \$200,00,000 worth French or Russian orders in the direction of Canadian factories. ders to that amount may be brought here on a commission basis. Germans Again Use Gas-Russian Advance Continues On Lower Reaches Of the Dubysa-Compelled To Withdraw From Shavli.

Petrograd, June 10 .- The mans have again reinforced their three army corps which raided the Baltic Province. Under the weight of the superior forces brought against them, the Russians have again been compelled to withdraw and concentrate their strength little west Shavli. On the lower reaches Dubysa, however, the Russian advance continues.

In the north of Rawa the Germans once more took advantage of a favoring wind to attempt to poison the Russian lines with gas.

The Russians have taken a number of German and Austrian prisoners at various sections of their Galician front, aggregating nearly 3,000.


