MYERS CAVE.

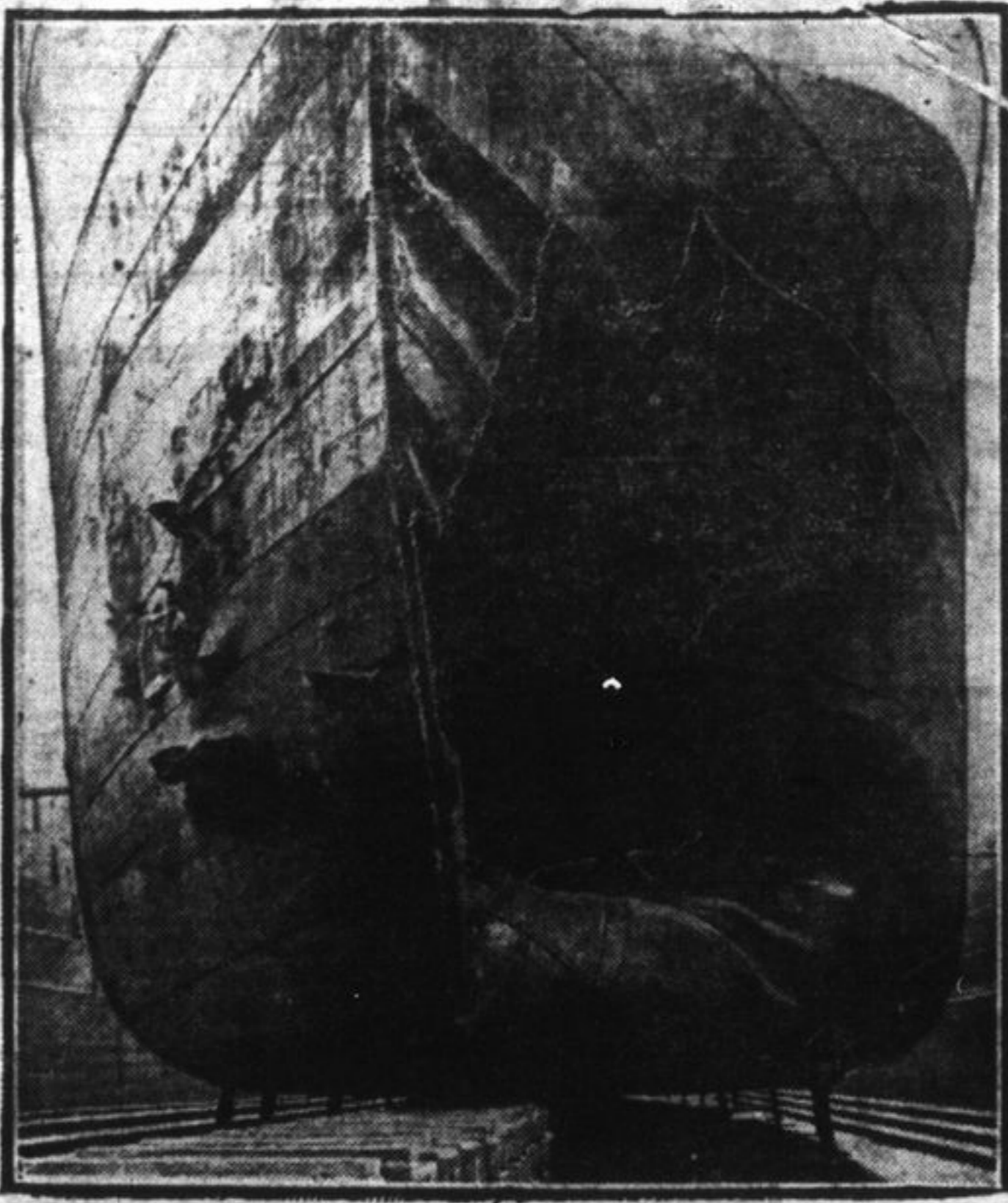
