What will happen to the 38th Battalion? This question is stirring not only the infantrymen in camp, but every soldier from officer down to private. If the 38th Battalion is to go overseas as a unit there is probability of other battalions formed since the second division crossed the ocean going into the trenches under one officer. Some time ago the order was issued that all men recruited after that date would be drafted into battalions and sent overseas in detachments or companies, but not in battalions. Two companies have already been sent overseas as reinforcements from the 38th Battalion, and a third is being given extra drilling and waiting to go at any time.

THE BOARD OF WORKS

RECOMMENDED PUTTING TARVIA ON UNIVERSITY AVENUE.

Ald. Couper Raised Strong Protest On Ratepayers Being Taxed For Work on Upper Princess Street Which Had Been Unsatisfactory.

That University avenue from Princess street to Stuart street be treated with Tarvia, was the motion put through at the meeting of the Board of Works, held on Tuesday afternoon, on the casting vote of the chairman, Ald. Graham, who voted yes with Aids. Couper and Richardson. Ald. Peters and Ald. O'Connor voted against it. When the question of what should be done with University avenue was taken up, Ald. Couper declared that the avenue was a disgrace to the city, and that something should be done to put it into good shape. The question of treating the roadway with tarvia was then discussed, and the chairman declared that he felt sure that he could get a petition signed by the property owners in favor of tarvia.

Ald. O'Connor said he was not prepared to vote in favor of tarvia just now. He desired to know what the residents on University avenue wanted before placing himself on record as being in favor of it. However, the question was put to a vote, when it was decided to recommend that the roadway be treated with tarvia. The job will include concrete curbs and gutters. Ratepayers were called for the supply of 12,000 imperial gallons of asphalt which will be used on William street and Aberdeen avenue. A list of tenders were received at various prices, but on the recommendation of the City Engineer, it was decided to award the contract to the Barber Asphalt Paving Company, Philadelphia, for Bermudez asphalt, at the rate of 16 1/2 cents a gallon.

Ald. Couper voiced a strong protest about the ratepayers on Upper Princess street, being called upon to pay for the tarvia which was placed in their roadway last summer. He said it had been put down as an experiment, and had not given satisfaction, although the tarvia had been put down under the company's own application, and instructions as to its care carried out.

Ald. Couper said that a representative of the company would be in the city in the course of a few days, and he urged that the matter be taken up with him. He held that it was not right to tax the people for something which had been an experiment, and which was not giving satisfaction. Three weeks after the road was treated with the tarvia the dust nuisance was something awful, in spite of the carrying out of the instructions given by the company putting it down. The engineer was instructed to take up the matter with the company's representative when he arrived in the city.

"I intend to take the matter into council," said Ald. Couper to his colleagues. The City Engineer asked that following out the usual custom, he be given some extra engineer, to help to rush along the summer's work, but the Chairman stated that he would not favor such a thing for one minute, saying that he would give the Engineer assistance in the office if it were necessary, but that he wanted the engineer to look after all the outside work.

The Engineer claimed that there was so much work on hand that he required outside help. Members of the Board desired information on the matter, with the result that the request of the Engineer was allowed to stand over.

The Chairman, Ald. Graham, was in the chair, and the other members present were Aids. O'Connor, Couper, Richardson and Peters.

If the N.H.A. will sanction the move to Cleveland, a syndicate may purchase the Toronto Club hockey franchise. Owner Frank Robinson of the Toronto, who is going to the front, has been gazzeted a major. He is connected with the Montreal Artillery Corps.

St. Louis gossip mentioned the name of Catcher "Jimmy" Archer of the Chicago Cubs as a New York Giant possibility of the very near future. Manager McGraw of the New Yorkers refused to discuss the possibilities of any deal leading toward this end. McGraw, however, admitted that he would be prepared to go a long way for Archer's services if this competent backdrop is on the market.

They will hope and pray for their success. Many millions will regret that no American soldiers are in those lines doing America's part in the battle to defend civilization."

"Let none mistake this fact. A wild beast is loose in the world a creature combining the ferocity of the animal with the lust of the degenerate human. The struggle is a struggle of nations; it is a battle between civilization and barbarism. A German victory would mean the destruction of all we hold best in our national life."
