Apparently he received his wounds in more recent fighting. He is eighteen years of age.

Tete de Pont Barracks Notes.
By the end of next week the recruits in "C" Battery will have been sufficiently trained to carry on battery work. At present the drivers are receiving two rides a day beside the physical training and driving

drills. The gunners are busy at section gun-drill and other elementary stages of their work. The men that have been obtained are a splendid lot, and if about twenty-five more of as good men could be secured the battery would be brought up to strength, and would be equal to any in Canada.

KILLED AT YPRES.

Lance-Corpl. Butcher Worked At Locomotive Works.

The Whig learned on Wednesday that Lance-Corporal R. L. Butcher, who left Kingston with the 14th P. W. O. Rifles, under command of Capt. George T. Richardson, had been killed in the Battle of Ypres, on April 27th. This is the first announcement of his death that has been made in Kingston. Lance-Corporal Butcher was formerly employed at the Canadian Locomotive Works as a fitter. The Whig published a large cut a month ago and No. 25 in it was the deceased soldier.

War Tidings.
One German army of eight divisions was entirely renewed, having lost in that period 150,000 men or 100 per cent. of its effectives.

As a mark of its confidence and admiration, the municipality of Rome has decided to confer the freedom of the city on Premier Salandra.

Signor Canova, left in charge of the Italian consulate at Trieste when the war broke out between Italy and Austria-Hungary, has been arrested and sent to a concentration camp.

The Norwegian steamer Durango, formerly the Ceylon, 2,280 gross tons, has been torpedoed and sunk by a submarine off the Hebrides islands. Crew saved.

Three hundred and forty-two cases of typhus had been reported in Austria in the week ending June 5th.

The capture of Moscska, an important station on the railway line between Przemyel and Lemberg, by the German army is claimed in the official reports.

The Kansas Child Hygiene Bureau will be under the direction of Dr. Lydia De Vilbiss, of New York city, who has decided to go to Kansas and undertake the work of organizing and conducting the bureau which was created to save the lives of babies who couldn't help themselves.

At Brampton, on June 3rd, Dr. Edward Leslie Burwell, Morris Park, L.I., N.Y., and Isabel Clarice, daughter of the late B. S. and Mrs. Turner, of Belleville, were married.
