WITH THE OVERSEAS TROOPS AT THE BARRIEFIELD CAMP

Prof. Harris' Gas Test to be Made.

MINISTER OF MILITIA IS EXPECTED TO MAKE A SURPRISE VISIT.

But the Units Are All Ready For Gallant General Sam - Wires Strung For the Arc Lamps For Camp Road.

Prof. Carr-Harris, of this city, claims he has discovered a gas which will neutralize the chlorine gas used by the Germans at the front, and in the course of a week or ten days, it will be given a test at the camp.
