

LEMBERG LIKELY TO FALL; THE RUSSIANS RETIRING

Austrians Are Storming Last Line of Defences.

THE KAISER ON HAND

TO SEE AUSTRO-GERMAN ARMY TAKE THE CITY.

Berlin Reports Say That the Russians Are Preparing to Evacuate—Heavy Guns Are Being Moved Away.

(Special to the Whig.)
Berlin (via The Hague, June 21).—Lemberg is expected here to fall before the eyes of the Kaiser who is with the Galician army. The Russians are preparing to evacuate the city.

A despatch from Przemyel early today reported that the Austrian regiments are storming the last line of Russian defences on a ridge eleven miles from the city and the Austrian shells are falling in the western suburb of the Galician capital.

Since early yesterday, train loads of Russian wounded have been hurrying out of Lemberg. They are moving north-east in the direction of Brody, five miles from the Russian frontier. Aviators have brought word that several train loads of heavy guns used in the defence of Przemyel are moving out of Lemberg.

What Will Grand Duke Do?

(Special to the Whig.)
London, June 21.—Never, perhaps, since before the battle of the Marne, have the Teutonic allies appeared so confident of success. Having failed in their original plan of crossing France, and then turning to Russia, they have reversed the order of their strategy, and now, judging by the expenditure of life and ammunition in Galicia, they have pinned their whole faith to so paralyzing the Russian army as to permit of the throwing of a tremendous weight of men and metal into the western theatre, there either to break through the Franco-British line or force an interminable period of sanguinary warfare.

The great question England and her allies are asking is whether Grand Duke Nicholas, commanding the Russian forces, can successfully emulate Joffre's tactics of last fall and check the Austro-Germans at the gates of Lemberg. Optimists point out that the Grand Duke checked them almost at the gates of Warsaw, just as Gen. Joffre stopped the Germans before Paris and Field Marshal Sir John French stopped them before Ypres, Dunkirk and Calais.

It is argued, further, that even should Lemberg fall, the Russians can drop back to equally formidable positions, utilizing the rivers and swamps and other advantages of the terrain, and it is the British contention that they could thus hold out for months. England and France, in the meantime, sending to their aid men and munitions, if necessary.

Rogers for Carleton.

Germany Says Allies Abused American Flag

Washington, June 21.—Serious charges of abuse by Allies of the American flag have been made by Germany to the State Department, it became known today. They cover at least half a dozen instances in the past two months. The American Embassy at London was asked for a report but has not yet replied.

NEW BRITISH WAR LOAN

Gunner R. Judson Gimblett, son of Mrs. Gimblett, 179 Queen street, has been recommended and will receive the Distinguished Conduct medal for bravery and devotion to duty in the battle of Langemarcke.

Italy Occupies a Large Piece of Austria

Rome, June 21.—The Italian invasion of Austria which is being pushed all along the frontier has resulted thus far in the occupation of more than twice as much territory as was offered by Austria as the price of Italy's neutrality. A communication from the Italian general staff states that the Austrian fortress of Malborghetto is being demolished.

OVER ELEVEN MILLION Spent by Government in Aiding the West.

Ottawa, June 21.—The Government has spent \$11,674,958 in relief work in the West. The Minister of Finance makes the statement that since August last the Dominion Government had advanced for the purchase of Canadian wolves, the sum of \$8,159,958, and for relief to settlers in the drought-stricken districts of those two provinces the sum of \$3,515,000, making a total of \$11,674,958.

ENLISTS AS A PRIVATE.

Hamilton Officer Joins the Princess Patricia.
Hamilton, June 21.—Gordon B. Glasco, one of the city's younger business men, has joined as a private a special company of men being enlisted for the Princess Patricia by Kenneth Molson, of Montreal.

WAVE DROWNS SEVEN.

Atlantic City, N. J., June 21.—Battered by huge waves and carried into deep water by a treacherous undertow seven bathers, including prominent members of the Philadelphia summer colony, were drowned in the surf yesterday.

Heavy Lists of Casualties Coming In.

\$10,000,000 Subway Opened.

New York, June 21.—The New Fourth avenue subway line in Brooklyn, the construction of which cost about \$16,000,000, and occupied nearly six years, was officially opened on Saturday. The route runs to Coney Island.

WIPED OUT BATTALION.

The Hungarians Were Corralled On Top of Mountains.
Udine, Italy, June 21.—On Wednesday afternoon over 1,000 Hungarians, commanded by a lieutenant-colonel, tried to take revenge for the Austrian reverse on Monte Nero. This time the Hungarians climbed Vrata Mountain, hoping from that height to dominate the Italian positions and outflank them from every side.

BECKER'S HOPE GONE

Court Refuses Application For Re-hearing The Case.
Albany N.Y., June 21.—The Court of Appeals denied the application of Counsel for Charles Becker, the former New York police lieutenant, for a re-argument on its decision affirming sentence of death.

The Emperor's Idea is Given as to Peace

Paris, June 21.—Extracts from a letter said to have been sent by the Emperor William to a personage connected with the Bavarian court, and published in Spain, are reproduced by the Matin. The Emperor is quoted as saying in part: "Our only object is a peace profitable for the German states. This peace may be concluded sooner than thought, if it gave for the time being only an incomplete result it would at least serve as a preparation for the future. It could be signed to-morrow if I wished."

CODERRE TO RESIGN.

And May Be Succeeded By J. N. Teller.
Ottawa, June 21.—The official announcement of the resignation of Hon. Louis Coderre as secretary of state and his elevation to the bench is expected to be made shortly by the Premier.
