SIR PERCY GIROUARD NOT AFRAID OF K. OF K. Famous French-Canadian Engineer Now Organizing Armament Production in England

When the full history of the European struggle comes to be written it will be found that the nation owes a great debt to Sir Percy Girouard. In company with Lord Moulton and Mr. George Booth, the "push and go man," Sir Percy, of recent months, devoted his magnificent powers of organization to the production of armaments. The brilliant French-Canadian has now been granted a major-generalship in the army, and thus yet another of Kitchener's young men has been given a responsible post. Like Sir Archibald Hunter and Sir Leslie Rundle, Sir Percy Girouard learnt much of his soldiering under "K. of K." He has been described as "the one man in the Egyptian Army who was unaffectedly unafraid of the Sirdar." Lord Kitchener though none the less of his brilliant staff officers for his self-confidence, and in the Sudan he made him his right-hand man. In the latter country and South Africa Sir Percy's skill as an engineer qualified him for the post of director of railways. "K. of K." former campaigner work invariably demanded the rapid building of miles of railroad, and Sir Percy Girouard cultivated the knack of flinging new railways across miles of virgin territory with record speed.

Sir Percy Girouard entered the army in 1885, was in the Dongola Expedition of 1898, and in the Nile Expedition of 1899.

Sir Percy has been summed up as a blend of French audacity and imagination. American ingenuity and British doggedness. At Woolwich on one occasion he strolled from the officers' mess in an immaculate dress suit and paid a surprise visit to the engineers under his control. He discovered one grimy mechanic with a face full of soot, endeavoring to start a refractory engine. "Fetch me some overalls," snapped Sir Percy, and five minutes later, with his dress suit covered with the greasy blue linseed oil, he had disappeared amidst the mass of cog-wheels, pulleys, and cylinders of the engine. He was out of sight for some time, but when he reappeared the machine was in order.

The toll paid by our noble ally has probably been ten times as heavy as that paid by ourselves. This has been inevitable, for it is known that the French Army holds a front of some five hundred and forty miles. The whole able-bodied manhood of France has been hurled into the fight. The richest industrial provinces are in the hands of an invader and have been systematically bled of treasure and supplies. Business throughout the whole Republic lies in a state of paralysis.
