Kingston, June 24.—(To the Editor): As a ratepayer I would like to know through your valuable column, how much of a saving would be made this year had the entire contract for paving and road oil, been given to the Imperial Oil Co., at the price tendered for, instead of splitting it up between outside firms handling tarvia and asphalt. I see by your paper a saving of \$88 could have been made on the last small contract lot. I understand that the city let a contract for tarvia macadam and also road tarvia. The asphalt road oil put on the Barrieffield Road seems to me to make a better road filler than tarvia. How do they compare in price? Also how does the tarvia paving compare with the asphalt paving. I will look to your papers for figures in detail showing how the matter works out. Thanking you for your valuable space.

TAXPAYER. Editor's note—Tarvia costs 12 cents a gallon and the Imperial Oil Company's road oil is only 5 cents a gallon, or much less than half. It is not yet determined the quantity required. Opinions differ as to the merits of tarvia and asphalt macadam. The latter is cheaper than tarvia.

IN MARINE CIRCLES.

Movements of Vessels Reported Along the Harbor.

The schooner Abbie L. Andrews cleared for Oswego, to load coal for Robert Crawford. M. T. Coy's Buletin: Steamer Advance arrived up light, from Montreal, and is undergoing repairs to her wheel; tug Glyde arrived at Prescott from Montreal, with oil barge No. 41; tug Hall cleared from Lachine to day, with three light barges for Kingston; tug Bronson arrived with one barge from Montreal. Steamers Toronto and City of Hamilton passed down Thursday morning. Steamer City of Ottawa is due up Thursday morning. Steamer Caspian will make her first trip on Friday afternoon, clearing up the lake at five o'clock.

The steamer Alexandria is expected to make her first trip on Saturday. The Government steamers Grenville and Simcoe, which for the past couple of days have been lying at the Kingston Shipbuilding wharf, cleared for points along the St. Lawrence River on Thursday morning. The steamer Haddington, which went into the Kingston Shipbuilding drydock on Wednesday morning, will have to be relieved of some twenty plates and new ones placed on.

Steamer Collinge, which has been unloading coal at the Locomotive Works wharf, cleared for Oswego on Thursday morning, and will load for Toronto. Steamer Beaverton passed down 1 a.m. Thursday; steamer Ames, up 1.30 a.m. Thursday; steamers Arabian and Strathcona are due down Thursday morning. The schooner Abbie L. Andrews, which has been unloading coal at the Water Works wharf, cleared on Thursday morning for Oswego. The schooner St. Louis, which unloads at the former wharf on Thursday.

German War Office Tells of Fate of Brockville Soldier. A telegram was received by United States Consul F. S. Johnston from Ambassador Gerard at Berlin which read as follows: "Prussian War Office states that Private Percy Bramley, of organization given as 81st Infantry Regiment, died from wounds in the thigh on May 15th in the Hospital Bruderhaus (House of Brothers) at Ralderborn." Some time ago the parents of Pte. Bramley, who enlisted at Brockville, asked Mr. Johnson to enquire about the case and the above cable was forwarded on Wednesday.

A GUNNER KILLED.

He Was Formerly With the Royal Canadian Horse Artillery. Word has been received in the city that Gunner Olat Olsen, formerly a member of "B" Battery, R. C. H. A., here, had been killed in action. At Valcartier Gr. Olsen was transferred to the Fifth Overseas Battery. While here Gr. Olsen proved himself a very efficient artilleryman, and became very popular with both officers and men. He was a Dane.
