HE WAS BADLY HURT

GUNNER FRASER BACK IN THE GENERAL HOSPITAL

The battery was moving towards the wireless station when Gunners Fraser, Dawson and McGregor were thrown off the gunlimber on which they were riding. McGregor was the luckiest of the three receiving only a severe shaking up. Dawson fell on a stone and injured his foot as well as receiving some bruises for treatment as a result of the accident. The gunimber passed over his left ankle and he received a compound fracture of the tibia. Gr. Fraser is rather unfortunate as he came out of the hospital on Wednesday. He had been receiving treatment for a poisoned hand.


