MISTAKE PORPOISES FOR SUBMARINES

Turkish Steamers Still Ply the Sea of Marmora--Excited Sailors Shoot at Fish.

Signboards Erected at Gallipoli to Show the Allied Warships Where Neutral Property is Located--The Gallipoli Peninsula is Far From Being Desolate.

Constantinople, June 24.—Turkish steamers still run up the Sea of Marmora from Constantinople to Gallipoli and Chanak, notwithstanding the activity of the British submarines. Their cargo is mainly war stores and munitions, and anyone who wishes to ship as passengers, whether he be Turk or alien, must have official permission to make the trip.

This section of the country is far from desolate. Every acre is cultivated. Roads wind in and out along the shore, and windmills crown the crest of the ridge of Gallipoli. Whenever the sea pushes into the land to form a bay, there is a little town, busy and prosperous in a Turkish manner of speaking.

HATRED OF ENGLAND

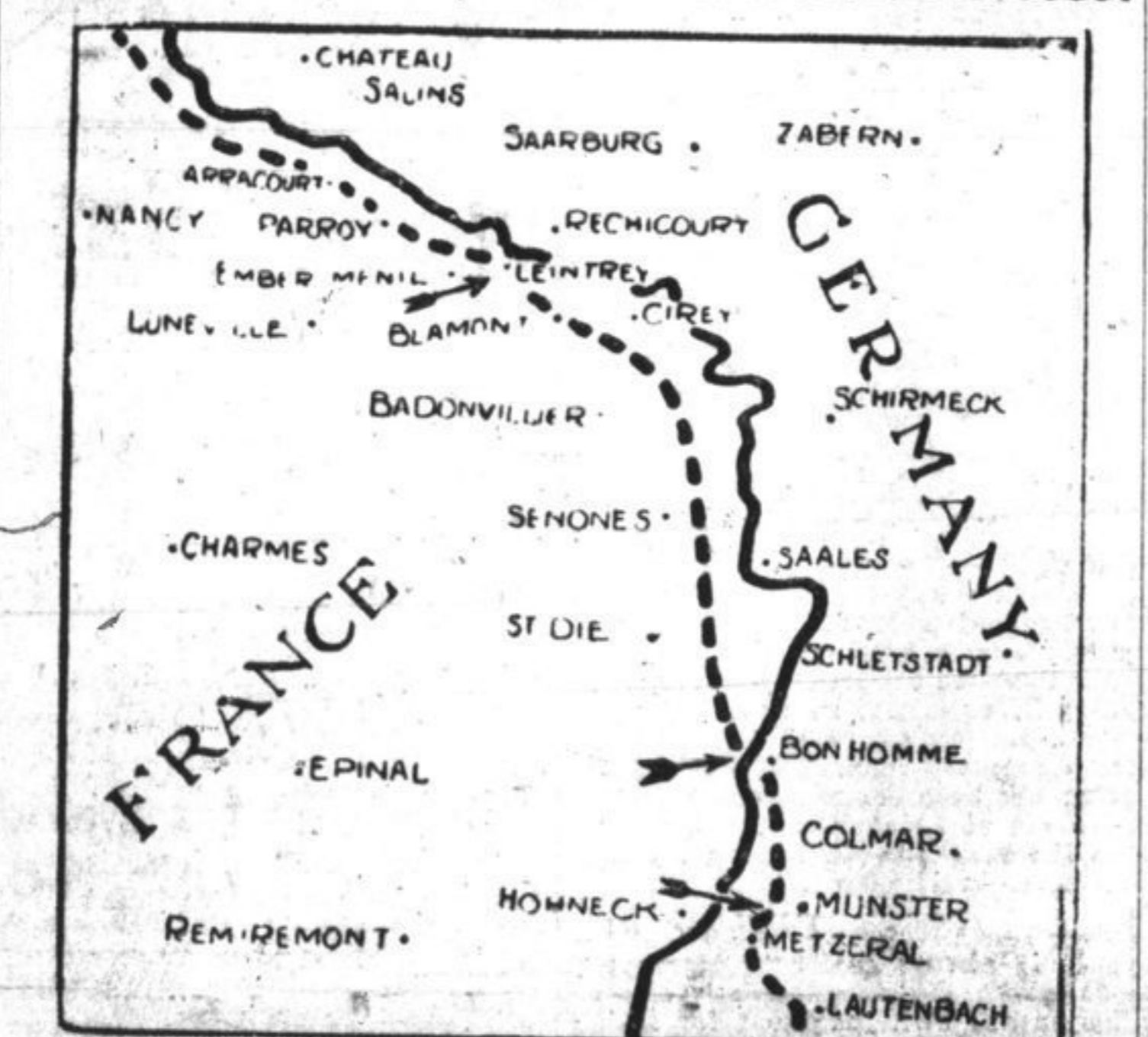

TURN TO CANADA; COMING OF TOURISTS

This Section of Canada Promises To Be Thronged By Summer Visitors From the States.

The Gates of Europe Will be Practically Closed and the Tourists Will Turn Their Feet Towards the Dominion--There is no Restriction to Prevent Free Intercourse Between the Countries.

ESCAPE FROM SINGAPORE

Lauterbach, an officer of the German sea raider Emden, which was sunk by the Australian cruiser Sydney off Cocos on November 9th escaped from Singapore during the mutiny of the native troops there the middle of last February, and accompanied by Adolph Schoenberg, a German business man who was interned by the British, after a remarkable experience arrived here to-day.

NO BUMPER YIELD

GERMANS CHARTING SKY

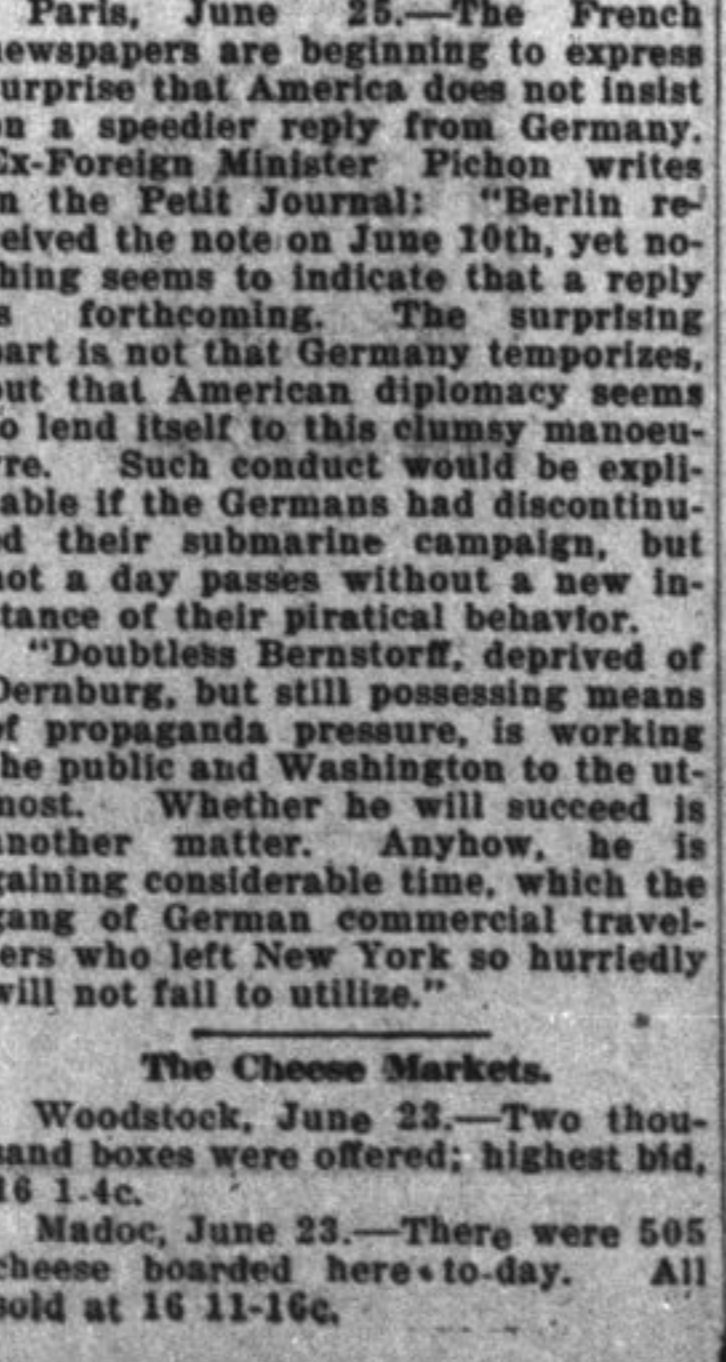

MAY PROLONG WAR

Britain and Russia Both Short Of Ammunition. London, June 25.—The Times military correspondent declares that neither Great Britain nor Russia has yet been able to get their full strength into the field for identical reasons—shortage of ammunition—and owing to this it may be necessary to postpone until next spring the final settlement with the Teutonic powers.

GERMANS ABANDON THE CLOSE FORMATION AS METHOD OF ADVANCE

Observers report that in this advance the Germans have almost entirely abandoned their former method of advance in close formation. In this picture the broken or open formation is illustrated. Wonders That America Allows Germany To Temperance. Paris, June 25.—The French newspapers are beginning to express surprise that America does not insist on a speedier reply from Germany. Ex-Foreign Minister Pichon writes in the Petit Journal: "Berlin received the note on June 10th, yet nothing seems to indicate that a reply is forthcoming. The surprising part is not that Germany temporizes, but that American diplomacy seems to lend itself to this clumsy manoeuvre. Such conduct would be explicable if the Germans had discontinued their submarine campaign, but not a day passes without a new instance of their piratical behavior."

FEELERS FOR PEACE

Germany Making Many Moves, Says Rumors At London. London, June 25.—Many curious rumors are widely circulating here concerning the growing German desire for peace. These rumors, coming from the most diverse sources, are that the German Government are, wholly but informally and indirectly, attempting to persuade either the Pope or the American President to sound the Allies upon a proposal to end the war as a draw.

SEE GERMAN INTRIGUE

London, June 25.—The Morning Post's Paris correspondent, referring to La Liberté's interview, says: "It may be said at once that the interview has produced a deplorable effect, and in clerical circles it is suggested that M. Latapie may be the victim of a deep-laid plot which is intended to prepare the way for a mediation in which the Vatican could be supported by the United States. French opinion is unanimous in believing that such mediation could only be the result of German intrigue. France intends to dictate peace together with her Allies, and desires no mediation between herself and her enemies. The idea of such mediation can only convince the nation that the Vatican is not on its side."

JOAN OF ARC BANNED

Germany Orders All Statues and Pictures Removed. New York, June 25.—An order has been issued by the German ecclesiastical authorities, according to the Vorwarts of May 26th, copies of which have just been received here, ordering the removal of all statues and pictures of Joan of Arc from the parts of Alsace and Lorraine in German possession. The paper says: "Bishop Hensler at Metz, in a decree, points out that the public adoration of the Maid of Orleans under the existing circumstances may be interpreted in a political sense. To prevent that, the pictures and statues of the French patron saint must be removed from all churches and meeting places."

Seek Device To Detect a Submarine

London, June 25.—The question of whether there exists any scientific method of detecting the presence of a submerged submarine, which was raised during the Lusitania enquiry, is now engaging the attention of the Admiralty. Suggestions have been made by a prominent Canadian to Donald Macmaster has submitted these to the Admiralty and to Lord Mersey, and the latter has promised to give encouragement to any experiments in the direction of settling the question.
