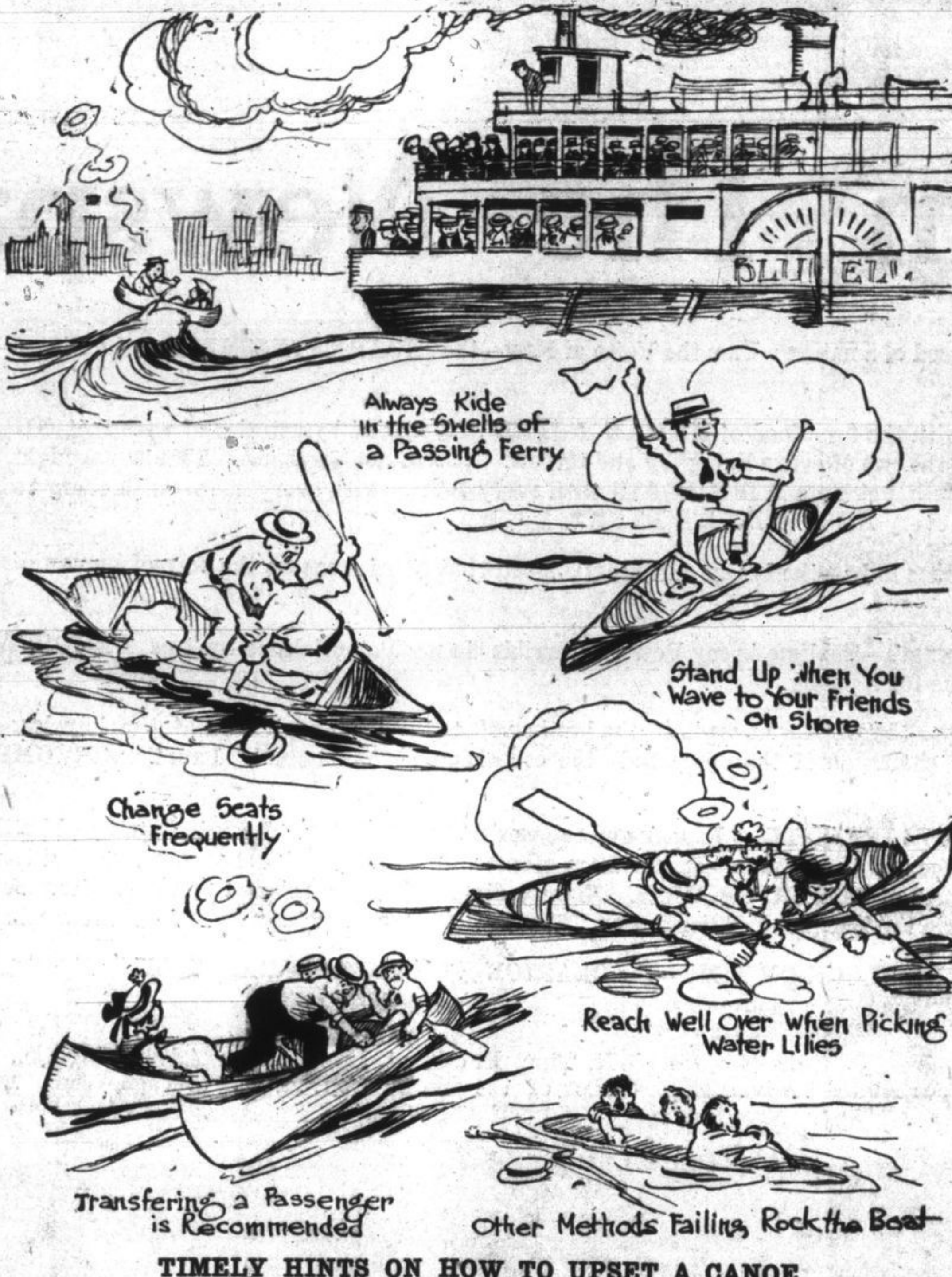

GERMAN TORTURED BY MEMORY OF DEED

Sank the Lusitania and Was Greeted on His Return to Germany With Taunts and Hisses From His Equals.

Friend Writes to American Telling of Remorse of Lieut. Hensing and Shame of Moderates in the Fatherland.

This story of the captain-lieutenant of the submarine which sank the Lusitania was received a few days ago by J. J. Hosiain, of Cambridge, Mass., president of the Alliance Universal, a society for the advancement of liberal ideas among the peoples of the Far East and the Near East, as a communication from a high ranking Socialist in the service of the Imperial Germany Navy. We do not touch for the story, but we should add that it comes from a source that has furnished inside news about German operations that has subsequently been confirmed.

THE FOE FACING ITALY

GROWS FORMIDABLE BUT FAILS TO MAKE HEADWAY. The Austrians so far have utterly failed in any way to check the Italian invasion. Turin, June 28.—Alpine soldiers have still further strengthened their position in the Carnic Alps by the occupation of Zellonkofel Peak, a mountain two thousand five hundred feet high, west of Freikofel and Monte Croce pass. Zellonkofel forms a part of the Kellerspizzen tableland, from which a march down upon Ploeken can be achieved in a couple of hours.

100 Per Cent. Bonds. Holders of the Fifth Avenue Bank will receive an extra dividend of 100 per cent. in addition to the regular quarterly dividend of 25 per cent., both payable to stock of record June 30th. The bank has only \$100,000 capital stock, and surplus and profits far in excess of \$2,000,000. The stock last week was quoted \$4000 bid and \$4,500 offered, being the highest prices for any bank stock in this city.

Along the Isone River the battle which began fifteen days ago, is still raging. The Italian covering troops are in close contact with the Austrians, who have retreated under protection of their fortresses at Tarvis, Colmano and Goritz. For several days the enemy succeeded in playing terrible havoc with the various villages, many of the inhabitants of which were killed or maimed by exploding shells from a cleverly concealed battery of 12-inch guns. When the Italian artillery men eventually discovered the whereabouts of this battery by the aid of air scouts, the Austrians, in mortal fear lest their cannon should be smashed or over-turned, sought to trick their adversaries by hoisting huge white banners bearing the Red Cross on the roof of a villa just behind the battery.

URGENT PERSONAL ECONOMY. Campaign To Be Inaugurated in London To-morrow. London, June 28.—That the seriousness of the economic situation in Great Britain is beginning to be realized is shown by the campaign about to be inaugurated for emphasizing the necessity for personal economy among all classes. The campaign in the hands of a strong Parliamentary Committee, will be opened next Tuesday at Guildhall, with Premier Asquith and Bonar Law the principal speakers. The Lord Mayor of London will preside. Meetings in all parts of the country will follow.

C. P. R. Dividend. New York, June 28.—The Wall Street Journal prints the following London cable: "Financial circles here have been very much perturbed over the report that Canadian Pacific dividend may be reduced. Sir Thomas Shaughnessy refuses to make a statement as to the future dividend policy of his company, but is quoted as saying: 'So far so good. It has had to be made in the dividend rate in spite of the decrease in earnings. Canadian Pacific is a very strong institution.'"
